GREATER LOVE HATH NO MAN THAN THIS: THE CRUCIFIXION OF JESUS



There have been great examples of love throughout Biblical history. Rebekah loved her son, Jacob, so much that she deceived her husband to see that he was given a blessing (Genesis 27). Jacob loved Rachel so much that he worked for her father for fourteen years just so he could marry her (Genesis 29). Moses loved the people to the point of standing between them and God to save them (Exodus 32). Jonathan loved David to the point of defying his father, the king, to save David's life (1 Samuel 19). However great these examples may be, none of them can hold a candle to the love that Jesus Christ showed for all of mankind in giving his life upon the cross for the remission of sins. Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends (John 15:13).

The pain and suffering of Jesus Christ started hours before He ever reached Calvary. Luke states, "And being in an agony he prayed more earnestly: and his sweat was as it were great drops of blood falling down to the ground." (Luke 22:44). Two verses earlier He had asked the Father to remove this cup from Him. The condition mentioned in Luke 22:44 is known as hematidrosis. This condition causes one's capillaries to burst near the surface of the skin causing bloody sweat and is a very painful condition that is caused by tremendous stress.

From this point, Jesus was betrayed at the Garden of Gethsemane by Judas. He was arrested and taken before an illegal Jewish court. He was taken before Pilate after He had been struck, spit upon, and scorned. After much deliberation, Pilate finally gave the go ahead for Jesus to be crucified. However, before crucifixion, He was scourged. That word may not mean anything to you right now, so let me explain exactly what was entailed in a scourging. Scourging was a Roman prerequisite to the

cross. When a victim was to be scourged, he was first stripped either totally naked or at least to where they wore nothing but a loin cloth. After the victim was stripped, he would be chained to a post that was about two feet high with an iron ring on either side of the post which the chain would be hooked. In some cases they would use a cross beam that would be laid across two supports about 6 feet high and the victim would be hooked to this crossbeam. In either case, the victim's body was positioned in such a way that the shoulder blades provided little or no protection for the underlying flesh. The Roman personnel that would carry out the scourging was known as a lictor. Unlike the



Jewish system, there were no limitations upon how many times the victim could be struck. The extent of the beating was dependent entirely upon the disposition of the

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lictor. Their only instructions were that the victim was to die on the cross, not on the scourging post. The weapon used was a whip that was made of several corded strands with either bits of metal or bone tied in at the end of the whip. These pieces of bone or metal were very sharp and oftentimes hooked. Normally, at a scourging there would be two lictors with these kinds of whips standing on either side of the victim and they would take turns striking. As the lictors struck, the whips would nearly encircle the body with these sharp pieces biting into the flesh and ripping the flesh to shreds. Brother

V.P. Black said that Jesus' shoulder blades would have looked like, "2 whitecaps on a I am the good shepherd... | ting pressure on the median nerve, large sea of blood." Oftentimes, it has been recorded that the lictors would not stop until the sheep. they could see the lungs inflate and deflate

through the back of the ribs. Now I hope when you read your Bible that you won't simply skip over the word "scourged" anymore. There is much that is associated with that word that we take for granted. Jesus did not begin to shed blood upon the cross but much sooner than that. Modern day doctors say that had this taken place in this day and time and had Jesus gone to an emergency room, he would have been immediately admitted to the Intensive Care Unit and would have been listed as being in critical condition. His body would have been in shock. So, please don't just skip over this word anymore, think about what he went through in the scourging and not just on the cross. Even after all this, he was made to carry his own cross (the cross-beam) to the hill of Golgotha, nearly 2.5 miles away.

This writer believes that we too often take for granted what Jesus had to endure both before the cross and while upon the cross. Dr. C. Truman Davis paints a very graphic word picture for his readers. He writes,

"The crucifixion began. Jesus was offered wine mixed with myrrh, a mild analgesic, pain-reliving mixture. He refused the drink. Simon was ordered to place the patibulum on the ground, and Jesus was quickly thrown backward, with His shoulders against the wood. The legionnaire felt for the depression at the front of the wrist. He drove a heavy, square wrought-iron nail through the wrist and deep into the wood. Quickly, he moved to the other side and repeated the action, being careful not to pull the arms too tightly, but to allow some flexion and movement. The patibulum was then lifted into place at the top of the stipes, and the titulus reading "Jesus of Nazareth, King of the Jews" was nailed into place.

The left foot was pressed backward against the right foot. With both feet extended, toes down, a nail was driven through the arch of each, leaving the knees moderately flexed. The victim was now crucified."

In further description of the process, Dr. Davis writes,

"As Jesus slowly sagged down with more weight on the nails in the wrists, excruciating, fiery pain shot along the fingers and up the arms to explode in the

brain. The nails in the wrists were putand I lav down my life for nerve trunks which traverse the midwrist and hand. As He pushed himself ~John 10:14-15 upward to avoid this stretching torment,

He placed His full weight on the nail through His feet. Again there was searing agony as the nail tore through the nerves between the metatarsal bones of the feet.

At this point, another phenomenon occurred. As the arms fatigued, great waves of cramps swept over the muscles, knotting them in deep relentless, throbbing pain. With these cramps came the inability to push Himself upward. Hanging by the arm, the pectoral muscles, the large muscles of the chest, were paralyzed and the intercostal muscles, the small muscles between the ribs, were unable to act. Air could be drawn into the lungs, but could not be exhaled. Jesus fought to raise Himself in order to get even one short breath. Finally, the carbon dioxide level increased in the lungs and in the blood stream, and the cramps partially subsided."

Our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, loved each of us to the extent that He laid down His life for us WHILE WE WERE YET SINNERS!!! (Romans 5:8). If that's not love, I don't know what is! He loved us enough to personally pray for those that would believe on Him through the teaching of His disciples (John 17:20-23). All He has asked for in return is that we keep His commandments. He says, "If ye love me, keep my commandments." (John 14:15). Not just a few of them, not just what we want to, but ALL of His commandments. Jesus showed His love for us by going to Calvary when He had the power to call ten legions of angels. How will we now show our love for Him and the sacrifice He made for us?

Studies For The Week of August 23rd:

Sunday Class2 Thessalonians (Chapter 1)
The Temptation of Jesus (Matthew 4:1-11)

Wednesday Class Daniel 9 Give Me A Mountain! (Joshua 14:12)

1. Jesus was prepared.

- a. He knew the importance of this situation (1 Pet. 1:18-19).
- b. We must prepare for temptation (1 Pet. 5:8; Dan. 1:8).

2. Jesus used scripture as His tool of defense.

- a. He knew the Word of God and therefore had an answer.
- b. We need to studay and know God's Word, the best and only weapon of the Chrisitan (Eph. 6:17; Ps. 119:11, 105).

3. Jesus analyzed the situation.

- a. He did not look just as the immediate benefits/results.
- b. Be like Moses who cared more for pleasing God (Heb. 11:25).

4. Jesus was unwilling to compromise.

- a. He did not try to justify sin or minimize its importance He gave a strong/right answer and held firm.
- b. We should stand for what is right (Eph. 6:13; Jude 3).

5. Jesus resisted the devil and the devil fled.

- a. Jesus proves that satan cannot argue with truth (James 4:7).
- b. But it requires resisting and it is only for a season (Lk 4:13).

6. Jesus was later comforted.

- a. After the temptations, Jesus was comforted by angels.
- b. There is a mental comfort we should gain by doing right, but also a comfort of an assurance of an eternal home (Rev. 2:10).

Often we are tempted to want to take the easy road, yet Caleb was ready to accept challenges with God's help.

1) He was a leader.

- a) He was trusted and respected. (Num.13:2)
- b) He was given honor and responsibility.

2) He trusted in God.

- a) He saw what everyone else saw but spoke up with confidence they could accomplish God's task. (Num. 13-14)
- b) He was willing to "go it alone" to stand up for what was right.

3) He didn't mind challenges.

- a) He accepted the mission of a spy and was ready to take the land.
- b) Even 45 years later at 85 he was still ready to take the land.
- c) This was because his confidence was in God (Josh. 14:8).
- d) Even knowing what awaited him, he asked for his mountain and accepted the challenge of conquering it (Josh. 14:9; 15:14).

We need more Calebs – those who will be examples, those who will show confidence in God, and those who are ready to face challenges with confidence in God.
