Pray Routinelyby Robert Dodson

Most of us have a certain routine that we go through each day. We don't even really think about doing it, we just do it out of habit. Is prayer a part of your daily routine? Jesus taught that men ought always to pray (Luke 18:1). From the beginning the church continued steadfastly in prayer (Acts 2:42). Paul admonishes us to pray on a regular basis (Rom. 12: 12; Eph. 6: 18; Col. 4:2; 1 The. 5: 17). Prayer was never meant to be just a ritual on Sunday, but a regular part of our lives. King David is a great example of this. He called upon God daily in prayer (Psa. 88:9), sometimes spending all day in prayer (86:3). Evening, morning and at noon he prayed (Psa. 55:17). It was Daniel's custom to pray three times a day (Dan. 6:10). These men saw the great need for prayer in their lives. They would not think of going a day without prayer. You and I should be just as dependent upon prayer, so that we would pray routinely.

Pray when faced with important decisions. Before selecting the twelve apostles, the Lord prayed all night (Luke 6: 12-16).

Pray before great events. The church's beginning grew out of a season of prayer (Acts 1: 14).

Pray when suffering physical afflictions (Psa. 88:9; James 5: 13; 2 Cor. 12:7 -9;2 Kings 20:1-11).

Pray when anxious or distressed (Psa. 18:6; 118:5; 120: 1; I Pet. 5:7; Phi. 4:6-7).

Pray when problems arise. When the problem arose in the early church concerning the neglect of the Grecian widows, the matter was immediately taken to God in prayer (Acts 6:1-4).

Pray before entering trials. Oh! The strengthening hours Jesus spent in Gethsemane in prayer to His Father just before the ordeals of His trials and subsequent crucifixion (Mat. 26:36-46).

Pray when suffering persecution. Upon being beaten with rods and being cast into prison at midnight Paul and Silas prayed (Acts 16:23-25).

Pray before separations. Upon leaving the Ephesian elders, to see their faces no more, Paul kneeled down, and prayed with them all (Acts 20:36-38).

Pray after great events in our lives. Immediately upon having fed the five thousand Jesus went up into a mountain apart to pray (Mat. 14:21-23).

Pray in the midst of the busy activities of life. As Jesus' fame was spread abroad and great multitudes were coming to hear Him and to be healed by Him, He withdrew Himself into the wilderness, and prayed (Luke 5: 15-16).

Pray when we sin. Psalm 51 is David's penitential prayer upon his having sinned with Bathsheba.

Pray when dying. Did not Stephen thus pray (Acts 7:59-60)? Yes, and our Lord prayed when He was dying (Luke 23:34, 46).

It is so easy for us to allow prayer to be crowded out of our lives. Instead we must take time to pray. Here are some practical suggestions to help you to pray routinely.

Find a quiet place to pray (Mark 1:35). Satan will try to distract us and interfere with our prayer life. But just as Jesus needed time alone with God, so do we.

Make a prayer list (1 Tim. 2:1). Keep up with our sick list, but also make your own list. Remember to pray for the church, your family and friends and all men, even your enemies. Also, don't forget to thank God for His many blessings and the victories He gives in your life. I often have a list of those I am trying to reach with the gospel. I may carry it in my pocket so that I will have it available to pray over and to add to it during the day.

Pray with others (Jam. 5:16). Find a friend with whom you can pray. Pray with your whole family. Pray with the church. Praying together draws us closer together. Others encourage us and help us to be consistent in our prayers.

Believe that God will hear and answer your prayers (Mat. 7:7-11). A little boy was afraid of the dark. One night his mother told him to go out to the back porch and bring her the broom. The little boy turned to his mother and said, "Momma, I don't want to go out there. It's dark." The mother smiled reassuringly at her son. "You don't have to be afraid of the dark," she explained. "God is out there. He'll look after you and protect you." The little boy looked at his mother real hard and asked, "Are you sure He's out there?" "Yes, I'm sure. He is everywhere, and He is always ready to help you when you need Him," she said. The little boy thought about that for a minute and then went to the back door and cracked it a little. Peering out into the darkness, he called, "God? If you're out there, would you please hand me the broom?" Aren't many of us like that little boy? We approach God in prayer, but do so with a questioning faith at best. It's like, if You are really up there, would You do such and such for me. It is like we really don't believe He is listening to us. Let us have faith in God and the awesome power available to us through prayer!

Coffee

I Will... (Psalm 119)

The love expressed by the psalmist to God's Word is shown in his stated resolutions:

- 1) **I Will of Purpose** (v8) he resolves to be obedient to God (cf. Dan 1:8; Josh. 1:7; Matt. 7:21).
- 2) **I Will of Right Thinking** (v15) he resolves to study and think on God's Word (cf. Ps. 1:1-3; Josh 1:8; 1 Tim 4:15; Jas 1:25).
- 3) **I Will of Pleasure** (v16) he resolves do God's will with pleasure (cf. Acts 8:39, 16:34, 5:41; 2 Jn 3; Lk. 10:20).
- 4) **I Will of Vigorous Effort** (v32) he resolves to put effort into following God; not half-hearted (cf. Lk. 9:23; Heb. 6:10-12; 2 Pet. 1:5-11).
- 5) **I Will of Voluntary Action** (v45) he resolves to serve God of free-will (cf. Lk. 9:23; Acts 2:40-41; Josh. 24:15).
- 6) **I Will of Missionary Spirit** (v46) he resolves to speak of God's will to others; he will not be ashamed of it (cf. Rom. 1:16; Mark 16:15).
- 7) **I Will of Gratitude** (v62) he resolves to give thanks to God (cf. v164; James 1:17; 1 Thess. 5:18; Col. 4:2).
- 8) **I Will of A Separate Life** (v69&78) he resolves to follow God, regardless of others (cf. Phil. 4:11-12, 1:15-18; Lk. 22:42; Matt. 5:10-12; Rev. 2:10).
