Your Beliefs: For God...or the Diversity of the Masses By Vendall W. Dollarhide

There was once a great pianist who was giving a concert in a large concert hall. When he finished the concert, everyone in the place stood up and gave him a standing ovation. Well, almost everyone. There was one old man in the front row that didn't stand, but everyone else was on their feet cheering wildly.

When the pianist walked off the stage, he was crying. His manager asked him what was wrong and he said, "Didn't you see the man in the first row who wasn't standing and wasn't applauding?"

The manager said, "Sure, I saw him. But that was the only person who was not standing and cheering. Why worry about one old man?"

Then the pianist said, "But you don't understand. That man was the composer of the music that I played tonight. He is the only one who counts. He is the only one who knows what the piece is supposed to sound like."

Who do you worship? Who do you follow? Who do you believe in? Who died for you?

Maybe these are some of the questions that we should be asking ourselves before choosing our path and the path for our congregations. It is becoming very apparent that many congregations in the brotherhood are seeking the approval of the masses instead of the one that designed the pattern. Diversity is great until it dictates what truth we should follow and how we should worship our God.

"And whatever you do, do it heartily, as to the Lord and not to men, knowing that from the Lord you will receive the reward of the inheritance; for you serve the Lord Christ" (Col. 3:23-24). Our congregations should proclaim the truth that comes from knowing God and His word, not the word or whim of the multitude.

Many hunger for the cheers of the crowd when they actually need to be listening for only the applause of God. If God says, "Well done," it doesn't matter what the rest of the world says about you.

Stand firm in the faith! That is what Paul writes to the Christians at Colosse. Paul states in Col. 1:21-22, "And you, who once were alienated and enemies in your mind by wicked works, yet now He bas reconciled in the body of His flesh through death, to present you holy, and blameless, and above reproach in His sight" There is a condition to being presented in this holy manner which is found in the next verse: "if indeed you continue in the faith, grounded and steadfast, and are not moved away from the hope of the gospel which you heard."

Is Christ's body important to you? Or are you more concerned about the world's "church?" I hope and pray that you answered YES to the first question and NO to the second! Satan is attacking the church for which Jesus died. He isn't attacking us with the weapons that he used on the first century church. He's simply using our egos and our own designated self worth. Our worth doesn't come from building great buildings or becoming "mega" churches. The Christians worth comes from

Helps in Handling Bereavement

Since the pale of death pierces every mortal, it is necessary for all of us to learn how to handle bereavement. I have watched with great admiration and respect the courage that has borne many a saint through hours of sorrow. Here is some of the practical advice I have seen others use in dealing with grief:

Express your emotions. Since Jesus wept, it should not be considered a Christian virtue to be unmoved by the loss of a loved one. There is a difference between suppressing one's emotion and losing one's self-control. The Bible does not say, "Sorrow not," but it says, "Sorrow not, even as others which have no hope" (1 Thessalonians 4: 13).

Seek the aid of your friends. The very presence of friends is an encouragement. When Paul neared Rome, the brethren came to meet him and he "thanked God, and took courage" (Acts 28:15).

Compel yourself to be with people. Your inclination may be to retreat into the refuge of privacy, but there is a greater need than one realizes to associate with others. David did (2 Samuel 12: 19-23).

Express your feelings in words. Talking about it will help you to accept it. If this is done at the outset of bereavement, one will sooner be able to stabilize his life.

Avail yourself of spiritual resources. Even though you may not have realized the importance of the Scriptures and their comfort, they can help in building your faith (Romans 15:4). The power of prayer and the peace of God are very precious possessions.

Don't brood over what might have been. Both Mary and Martha said, "If thou hadst been here, my brother had not died" (John 11:21,32).

Actively pursue worthwhile tasks. Once the initial shock has been dealt with. get busy at other things. Resolve like Paul to reach "forth unto those things which are before" (Philippians 3: 13).

Make careful, thoughtful decisions. Many an individual jumps hastily into deciding the full scope of the future rather than waiting until he has regained a proper perspective of life. Don't get in a hurry (Proverbs 14:15). Make prayerful decisions.

Increase your trust in God. Those who have come through their sorrows with a deeper faith can verify that God, who rules over all, truly does make all things work together for good (Romans 8:28).

After the crisis of grief, you can serve more fully and sympathize more completely with men of like passions. With Paul, you too can thank God for the comfort received in knowing that it has now given you the ability to comfort others who are in any trouble.

Jack Stultz (1943-2010)

Jack Stultz died Wednesday night after a year of fairly constant surgeries, hospital stays, chemo/radiation treatments, and rehab. But having already had one leg amputated and having suffered from many injuries over the years, Jack was no stranger to difficulties and that is possibly one of the things that impressed most of



us. When many others might have given up or felt sorry for themselves, that was not Jack's way—he just kept going. He saw each of the things he faced in life not as burdens pressing down on him, but merely challenges to conquer. I never once heard him ask why these things happened to him, he just made the most of each day.

Jack was a hard worker whether driving trucks or working as a manager on golf courses and in fact continued to work until last fall when he was no longer physically able to do so. Among his loves in life were playing golf, reading, visiting with friends, and spending time with his family.

Of course the greatest memory that I keep of Jack is of our Bible studies together. I began studying with him last August I believe and what immediately impressed me was his desire to learn more about God and His Word, not just allowing the studies to continue but eagerly anticipating them like no one I have seen before. He studied on his own in addition to our studies and made the greatest decision of his life this past September when he was baptized for the remission of sins and added to the church; it was truly a day of joy for him and his family. Because of his faithful obedience to the gospel, we can have the comfort in knowing that Jack is at rest:

And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain... (Revelation 21:4)
