How to Truly Approach God by Mike Vestal

The story of a leper whom Jesus would heal tells us much about the attitude we should possess when we approach God in worship today. The account is found in, Matthew 8:1-4, Mark 1:40-45, and Luke 5:12-16. This man suffered from a repulsive and devastating disease, one that also was stigmatizing and incurable. Luke 5:12 says of this particular case, "behold, there was a man covered with leprosy." There was no covering up the fact the man was covered up with leprosy! Notice how this man comes to our Lord.

HE CAME EARNESTLY. Now there's an expression not used too much anymore, but it has to do with purpose and determination (cf. Matthew 8:2; Mark 1:40). The leper did not allow the crowd or their words to keep him from Jesus. He was willing to deal with any obstacles or disadvantages to get to Jesus. Getting to Jesus was the most important thing in the world to him, and the leper knew it. Do we?

HE CAME REVERENTLY. The leper "bowed down before Him" (Matthew 8:2). He fell "down on his knees before Him" (Mark 1:40), and "fell on his face and implored Him" (Luke 5: 12). The leper realized that worship must honor the Lord; everything in his approach to God showed the man's desire to honor Jesus. How about us?

HE CAME FAITHFULLY. "Lord, if You are willing, You can make me clean" (Matthew 8:2). In true worship, we honor God, His power and His will. The leper does not doubt Jesus or His power, but speaks with great trust, deferring to the Lord, "if you are willing." In worship we come to God in faith acknowledging that He knows best and will see us through. Is this what we do in our approach to God in worship?

HE CAME HUMBLY. When the leper approached Jesus, he did not come in a proud, demanding way. He didn't say Jesus "owed" him anything. He didn't "name it and claim it" like some of the "health and wealth" preachers of today. Nor did he seek to hide his condition or to in any way lesson its condition. There was no pretense whatsoever, only humility in the presence of the Lord. Is our worship of God characterized by a lack of pride and pretense, showing deep humility?

HE CAME WISELY. "And a leper came to Jesus, beseeching Him, and falling on his knees before Him, and saying, 'If You are willing, You can make me clean'" (Mark 1:40). There are at least five references to Jesus in just this verse! Jesus was the ONLY One who could help the leper, and the emphasis was ALL UPON HIM. How about us in our worship? Does our heart say, "Lord, it's ALL about You?" Do our actions convey the wisdom that God is the focus of it all?

Yes, we really can learn a great deal about how to approach God in worship from this leper. As God's people, let's remember that we have been cleansed from sin by the blood of the precious lamb of God. We are victorious because of Him. May we convey that love and joy to God.



Seek ye the LORD while he may be found, call ye upon him while he is near: Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts: and let him return unto the LORD, and he will have mercy upon him; and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon.

Language

Man uses language to communicate his thoughts and feelings. God used language to reveal His love as well as His directions for man. Often the Bible warns us about using filthy language, (Gal. 3:8) and commands us to control our tongues, (James 3:6-10). In this article we want to deal with the positive use of language. With our language we express our undying love and commitment to God. "For with the heart one believes unto righteousness, and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation," (Romans 10:10). How precious to the ear of God to hear the sweet confession of those once estranged who are now redeemed through their faith and obedience. How God must rejoice to hear His saints express their love for Him. It is through the use of language that we worship our spiritual God, (John 4:24). We sing praises to Him, "speaking to one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord," (Ephesians 5:19). Notice the passage in Hebrews 13:15 "Therefore by Him let us continually offer the sacrifice of praise to God, that is, the fruit of our lips, giving thanks to His name. "God gave us our voices to praise Him and worship Him. How it must please God to hear the combined voices of His people lifting up their praises in song on the Lord's Day. With language we lift our voices in prayer, "Give heed to the voice of my cry, my King and my God, for to You I will pray. My voice You shall hear in the morning, O LORD; in the morning I will direct it to You, and I will look up," (Psalms 5:2-3). With the language of men we preach the glorious gospel, "The Spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me, because the LORD has anointed me to preach good tidings to the poor; He has sent me to heal the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to those who are bound," (Isaiah 61:1). This great prophet understood the responsibility and the privilege of preaching God's message. With our voices we share the good news of Christ to a lost world just as Jesus commanded in Mark 16:16-18. With language we warn weak brethren to not give up but encourage them to be strong in temptation, "exhort one another daily, while it is called "Today," lest any of you be hardened through the deceitfulness of sin" (Hebrews 3:13). With language we can lift up hands that are weak and strengthen the legs of the feeble. As God's children we should exhaust our verbal energies to the benefit of others and to glorify Him and not waste our language on vain, obscene, and worldly palaver.

(Colossians 4:6 NKJV) Let your speech always be with grace, seasoned with salt, that you may know how you ought to answer each one.



Studies For The Week of September 19th:

Sunday Class......1 Corinthians (Chap. 13-14)

Dreaming of a Harvest White (John 4:35)

Jesus had what many might consider an impossible dream (Mark 16:15-16) and yet He knew it was not impossible for He had a vision that should still be ours today of a white harvest (John 4:35), a harvest that began to be gathered in during the first century and continues today when we see what He saw (Matt. 9:35-38):

The Meek (Matt 5:5)

1. Does Not Mean Weakness

- a. Ancient usage was of something powerful brought under useful control; it was an admirable quality.
- b. Two great examples of meekness were Moses (Num. 12:3; cf. Ex 32:10, 11-13, Num. 14:13-19; 16; 21:7) and Christ (Matt. 11:28-30; cf. Matt. 21:12; John 2:15; Matt. 23; Matt. 27:13-14; 1 Pet. 2:23; Matt. 26:53).

2. Power Under Control

- a. Meekness must be a part of the Christians life (Gal. 5:23; Col. 3:12; 1 Pet. 3:4; Eph. 4:1-2; 1 Tim. 6:11; Gal. 6:1; 1 Pet. 3:15; 2 Tim. 2:24-25; Titus 3:1-2).
- b. But rather than weakness this is yielding our power and will to God (James 1:21; Rom. 6:13; 1 Pet. 2:23); we have power to do as we wish, but we submit to the will of God and His instruction, such takes great strength and courage.

3. Reward for Meekness

- a. Become more Christ like (1 Pet. 2:21).
- b. Inherit the earth; be the greatest benefactors and the most thankful for the blessings of God (James 1:17) and yet recognizing we have something far greater in store.

Will we set forth with courage and strength that is yielded to the control of God's Will?

1. He saw the multitudes.

- a. He took special note of them; we too have to see the people that are all around us as precious souls that will spend eternity somewhere (Gen. 1:27; 2 Cor. 5:10).
- b. Recognize that Jesus concern was not just for the whole, but each individual (Matt. 11:28-30; Matt. 28:19; Mark 16:15).

2. He saw them as they were.

- a. He saw their true spiritual condition and had compassion on them; He was motivated by love (Lk 19:10; Jn 3:16; 15:13).
- b. We have to first see peoples' condition (Matt. 9:12; Eph. 2:1, 12) and then be driven by love to help them (example of Paul 1 Tim. 1:15; 2 Cor. 5:9-11, 14).

3. He saw them as they could be.

- a. He recognized the great potential for this white harvest; He was come to be their shepherd (John 10:11; Rom. 6:23).
- b. He was already teaching them and that continues to be our mission today (Rom. 1:16; 2 Tim. 4:2; Rom. 10:15).
- c. Warning: be prepared to be those laborers (1 Cor. 3:9, 6).
