"One Another" Passages By Kirk Talley

It has been said before that Christianity is a "one another" religion. This is true in both the negative sense (i,e., "do not deprive one another" from 1 Cor. 7:5) and in the positive sense (i,e., "bear one another's burdens" from Gal. 6:2). It is the purpose of this article to give an overview of how the Bible instructs us to be "one another" in our lives. Please take note of the scope of God's Word concerning a lifestyle that bears in mind…one another.

Let's begin with the negative usage of "one another."

1 Cor. 4:6—We are not to be puffed up against one another.

Gal. 5:15—We are not to destroy one another.

1 Cor. 7:5—Couples are not to deprive one another of self.

1 Cor. 6:7—We are not to go to law against one another.

James 5:9—We should not grumble against one another.

Titus 3:3—We are certainly not to hate one another.

Rom. 14:13—"Let us not therefore judge one another..."

Col. 3:9—We are not to lie to one another.

Gal. 5:26—Let us not provoke one another to envy.

James 4:11—We should not slander one another.

Acts 7:26—Capsulated in this one verse is the answer...we should not wrong one another!

Mankind could spend a lifetime working on the attitude needed to fulfill the aforementioned passages. Those are recorded in the Bible, among other passages, to show us there are boundaries in relationships between mankind. There are limits to how we can treat people with our different ways, thoughts, and words. We need to be ever respectful of...one another.

Notice now with me the positive aspect of the "one another' passages in the Bible.

John 13:34—"...that ye love one another..."(15:12,17; Rom. 13:8; 1 John 3:11,23; 4:7,11,12; 2 John 1:15)

Rom. 12:10—"...with brotherly love, in honor preferring one another..."

Rom. 15:7—"..receive one another..."

Rom. 15:14—"...admonish one another..." (Col. 3:16; 1The. 5:11; Heb.3:13; 10:25)

Rom. 16:16—"Salute one another.." (1 Cor. 16:20; 2 Cor. 13:12)

Gal. 5:13— "...serve one another..."

Gal. 6:2—"...bear ye one another's burdens..."

Eph. 4:2—"forbearing one another..."

Eph 4:32—"...forgiving one another..."

1 The. 4:18— "wherefore comfort one another..."

Heb. 10:24—"consider one another..."

It would behoove all of us to take a daily look at these references to the ultimate end of being more for "one another" going to heaven! Let us strive to be kind, to love each other while all along keeping our judgments righteous and our grumbling private. Now, it's your responsibility to go and be better...one to another!

sage." What is that message? "Be yourself," says the ad, rather than someone "others want you to be." Emblazoned in large letters on the front of the workbook and DVD is the single word—"Me."

venting her self-indulgence. The woman was deceived, believing the serpent's promise that she would be "like God" (Gen. 3:4). She yielded to the appeal of autonomy: "I am the master of my own fate; I am my own God; I will do as I please." Thus Satan convinced her that her best interest was to do what she knew God did not want her to do.

The Deceiver has another tactic, just as subtle and equally destructive, which is seducing multitudes today. With Eve, it was, "God doesn't want you to partake: do it anyway." With the trendy, new age "Gospel of Me" he says: God actually wants you to partake—to do whatever you feel is being true to yourself." With this, he appeals to the same impulse—the desire for self-determination and freedom from restraint—taking the tempted down a different path which ends up at the same, idolatrous place: I will be God. The difference from his strategy in the Garden is in convincing us that doing as we please is not defying the will of God, but fulfilling it.

This Satanic seduction is the Gospel according to Oprah, not Jesus Christ. Oprah'as views on spirituality are well known and epitomize the rise of new age spiritualism in the West. And it's easy to see the appeal. The influential media diva preaches the palatable pluralism of our time: There are many paths to the Divine, and the Divine is found within. My life is a spiritual journey to the discovery and adoration of...me.

For an example of the popularity of this deification of self, consider Liz Gilbert's *Eat Pray Love*. The best-selling memoir is now a film by the same title in which Julia Roberts portrays Gilbert, who divorces her devoted husband to launch on a pilgrimage of self-discovery. As one critic put it, the film reveals how her entire life "reeks of relentless self-indulgence" as she learns how to accept herself, and that life is apparently all about her.

This devilish drivel is prevalent in pop culture, but we find its most insidious expression in churches preaching a self-centered gospel cloaked in the garb of "being all God created you to be." I cringed when I encountered recently an ad for a curriculum for churches called "The Me I Want To

If the curriculum's publisher intends only to encourage us to recognize and develop our unique, individual talents in the service of God, then fine. But the blatant promotion of "Me" smacks of the spiritual narcissism of our age which reverses the emphasis of the true gospel.

How so? Isn't the gospel about how God loves *me*, wants fellowship with *me*, and wants to spend eternity with *me*? Didn't Paul say in Galatians 2:20 that Jesus "loved *me* and gave himself for *me*"? Yes, but in that very passage he also said, "I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me." Here the apostle affirms that life is not about self-indulgence but self-denial; not living for self, but dying to self to live for Christ. Jesus denied himself to bear the cross for us (Phil. 2:5ff) and demanded we do the same to follow him (Mat. 16:24). The irony is that denying self to live for him rather than ourselves is the only true way to "find" ourselves, what we were truly made to be (16:25).

And what we were truly made for is something beyond ourselves—the glory of God. Everything God has done in Christ is in order to redeem us from our sinful self-indulgence for a higher purpose—"for the praise of his glory" (Eph. 1:3-12). The Oprafied Gospel of Me so many churches have unwittingly bought into and which the Devil disguises as discipleship turns the focus from the glory of God to the idolatrous indulgence of self, catering to our self-destructive propensity "to worship and serve the creature rather than the Creator" (Rom. 1:25). It is the whisper of Satan: "It's all about you."

According to God's word, the very reason we need the cross is because we've believed that lie. I can only be true to myself—be what God wants me to be—when I realize that, ultimately, it's not all about me. It's about God saving me from me, not just for me, but for "his name's sake" (Psa. 23:3).

It's about him.

Studies For The Week of October 31st:

Sunday Class...... 1 Corinthians (Chap. 15)

The Persecuted (Matt. 5:10-12)

Those who implement the first seven beatitudes in their lives are sure to suffer the eighth – persecution.

1. Persecution Expected

- a. Jesus warns us that persecution will come to those who live this way.
- b. It sets them apart from the world and like Him, the world will reject us (1 John 2:16; John 1:4-5, 10-11, 15:18-21).
- c. This persecution is for righteousness and His sake a consequence of living right (2 Tim. 3:12; 1 Pet. 4:15-16; John 3:19-20).

2. Response to Persecution

- a. Rejoice and be exceedingly glad (Acts 5:41-42; 1 Pet. 4:13-14); keep being faithful (Heb. 10:32-33).
- b. Attitude possible because of the great reward (Rom. 8:18; 2 Cor. 4:8-18) and because it places us in good company (Heb. 11:32-40; Acts 7:52; James 5:10).

Will we stand up under persecution? Will we be faithful even to the point of death (Rev. 2:10)?

Society says its all about "me" but such an attitude:

1. Removes Focus From God

- a. Never considers God (James 4:13-15)
- b. Never thanks God (James 1:17; Col. 4:2); no surpise that such an attitude leads us away from God (Rom. 1:21; 2 Tim. 3:1-5).
- c. Never trusts God (1 Tim. 6:17).

2. Removes Focus From Others

- a. No liberality towards others though richly blessed (1 Tim. 6:18).
- b. Attitude stands in opposition to the Chrisitan mindset and Christ (Phil. 2:3-5) as well as other great examples (2 Cor. 12:15; 2 Cor. 8:1-5).

3. Removes Focus From Eternity

- a. Short-sighted; thinks only of the here and now and what brings temproal pleasure (Col. 3:1-2; Heb. 11:25).
- b. Showed greater concern for physical rather than spiritual life (Luke 12:33-34).
- c. Allows things of life to distract us from God (1 Tim. 6:9-10) instead of securing eternal life (1 Tim. 6:19).
- d. Where does our focus lie (Luke 9:23-25)?
