GOOD COUNSEL

Seeking counsel is a very important undertaking – one to be considered seriously. One may seek legal counsel, financial counsel, marriage counsel, spiritual counsel, and a host of other types of counseling.

Many may not realize that seeking counsel is a biblical principle. Solomon, a great man of wisdom, declared, "The way of a fool is right in his own eyes; But he that is wise hearkeneth unto counsel" (Pro. 12:15). "By pride cometh only contention; But with the well advised is wisdom" (Pro. 13:10). "Where there is no counsel, purposes are disappointed; But in the multitude of counselors they are established" (Pro. 15:22). "Every purpose is established by counsel; And by wise guidance make thou war" (Pro. 20:18). "For by wise guidance thou shalt make thy war; And in the multitude of counselors there is safety" (Pro. 24:6).

With regard to seeking counsel, there is an item that we need to consider seriously and be warned about. There has always been and there will always be two basic types of counselors: good and bad. A good counselor is one that gives trustworthy advice – advice of benefit, and a bad counselor gives poor advice – advice that produces harm.

The difficulty arises when trying to distinguish between the two. Often one finds out that one is a bad counselor only after they have heeded his advice - having damaged their situation. Is there a way to discover if one is a good or bad counselor before seeking their advice? Is there a way of protecting ourselves from bad advice? Let me suggest some biblical principles that will enable us to be better informed on how to choose good counsel.

Most importantly, it is vital that we understand that the best counsel is always Divine counsel. The Psalmist declared, "I will bless Jehovah, who hath given me counsel; Yea, my heart instructeth me in the night seasons" (Psa. 16:7), and "Thou wilt guide me with thy counsel, And afterward receive me to glory" (Psa. 73:24). "This also cometh forth from Jehovah of hosts, who is wonderful in counsel, and excellent in wisdom" (Isa. 28:29). Jeremiah also tells us that the Almighty is "great in counsel" (Jer. 32:19).

How does the Lord give us counsel today? God gives us counsel today through the Bible. Paul says, "Every scripture inspired of God is also profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, for instruction which is in righteousness. That the man of God may be complete, furnished completely unto every good work" (2 Tim. 3:16-17). It is of the utmost importance to remember that if we ever receive counsel that violates biblical counsel – we know that counsel is bad and should not be heeded. A good counselor will ALWAYS use the Bible as his guide.

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But whoso looketh into the perfect law of liberty, and continueth therein, he being not a forgetful hearer, but a doer of the work, this man shall be blessed in his deed. James 1:25

A People of Character

God wants to have a relationship with man. When He created Adam and Eve, He did so in such a way as to make them capable of having a relationship with Him (Gen. 1:26-27). He gave them guidance in what this relationship would mean and what it took to maintain it (Gen. 2: 1617). He also gave them one another to help them understand and appreciate what a relationship truly means (Gen. 2:24-25). However, Adam and Eve forsook their relationship with God because they forsook the character that made it possible (Gen. 3:6). When God established Israel as a nation, He told Moses, "Now therefore, if ye will obey my voice indeed, and keep my covenant, then ye shall be a peculiar treasure unto me above all people: for all the earth is mine: And ye shall be unto me a kingdom of priests, and an holy nation. These are the words which thou shalt speak unto the children of Israel" (Ex. 19:56). Israel had an opportunity to enjoy a special relationship with Jehovah God; however, they too forsook this privilege, following after idols and plunging themselves into captivity. Nevertheless, God still wanted a relationship with man, and sent Jesus to die on the cross so that the shedding of His blood might make possible the forgiveness of sins (Heb. 9:22) and so allow a holy God to sanctify people so that they might come to Him and enjoy the relationship they had abandoned through their sin (Isa. 59:2).

While God approached men individually in the patriarchal age and approached a nation collectively in beginning the Mosaical age, in Christianity He has chosen to approach men individually through the gospel in order to create, through their individual obedience, a new nation in the church. Whereas under the Old Law He established a relationship with a nation that was to be taught to the individual members of the nation (Deut. 6:4-8), under the New Covenant, individuals would receive instruction, and those who were willing would become part of a new nation. "For this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, saith the Lord; I will put

my laws into their mind, and write them in their hearts: and I will be to them a God, and they shall be to me a people: And they shall not teach every man his neighbour, and every man his brother, saying, Know the Lord: for all shall know me, from the least to the greatest. For I will be merciful to their unrighteousness, and their sins and their iniquities will I remember no more. In that he saith, A new covenant, he hath made the first old. Now that which decayeth and waxeth old is ready to vanish away"(Heb. 8:10-13). Thus, by calling all men to return to God by the gospel (2 Th. 2:14), and making their return to truth through repentance and obedience a requirement of entering the new nation and new relationship with Him (Acts 17:30; Rom. 6:16-18), our Lord has placed character front and center in our relationship with Him. Our God has always required holiness of His creation, because He is holy (1 Pet. 1: 15-16). He has always required love of His creation, because He is a God of love (Mt. 22:37-40; 1 Jn. 4:7-11). However, in Israel of old, these expectations defined the covenant but not the people. With Christ, this has changed. In spiritual Israel, the church, character defines the people of God in accordance with the covenant as much as the covenant itself is defined by God's character. To be a Christian is not the same as having an ethnic identity, whereby we can lay claim to being of a race of people regardless of what we believe or do. Instead, God set aside all those other barriers to define His people by character alone in their relationship with Him (Gal. 3:26-27; Rom. 1:16-17).

God designed the church to be a people of character—not a people that attend at a place that bears the name of Christ but a people who live in such a way as to wear the character of Christ. God wants to have a relationship with man; He wants to have a relationship with you. However, this relationship centers on character—God's character and yours. When we submit our will to God, our character lines up with God's, and we can have a relationship

Visitation Meeting



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Another important bit of advice in choosing counsel is that we should listen carefully to "old men's counsel" (1 Kgs. 12:13) and be cautious of the counsel of "the young men" (1 Kgs. 12:8). Rehoboam failed to do this and was the contributing factor in the dividing of the kingdom of Israel (1 Kgs. 12). Those of many years have a great amount of wisdom and experience that can be very valuable in our decision making process. Beware of the counsel of the youthful. This has been the downfall of many congregations – heeding the ill-informed or misinformed advice of young preachers/youth ministers coming out of liberal colleges. Please do not forsake the counsel of the older and biblically sound men of the congregation.

We also need to listen to the counsel of several that we may weigh their advice with other advice given enabling us to make the proper choices. "Where no counsel is, the people fall: but in the multitude of counselors there is safety" (Pro. 11:14). "Where there is no counsel, purposes are disappointed; But in the multitude of counselors they are established" (Pro. 15:22). One may have certain insights in an area, or experience in an area that other may not have. Limiting our counsel will limit our chances of getting good advice or the best advice. We may also think of it as a kind of "check and balance" system, which may prevent us from making wrong decisions.

Remember, "he that hearkeneth unto wise counsel is wise" (Pro. 12:15).

Search the Scriptures

Be like the Bereans who "received the word with all readiness of mind, and searched the scriptures daily, whether those things were so." (Acts 17:11)

Studies for the week of July 17, 2011

Jesus: "I Am The Door" (John 10:7, 9)

Jesus uses a parable to show His compassionate care; He is like a shepherd that lay at or guarded the door of the sheepfold for the protection of his sheep.

1. He is the only door

- a. These statements continue to point to His exclusivity as the savior of the world (Acts 4:12).
- b. They should remind us that it is always God's way which leads to blessing or any other that leads to destruction (cf. Deut. 11:26-28; Matt. 7:13-14, 24-27, 12:30).
- c. Many look for or try to create another way, but such won't work (Rom. 10:1-3).

2. He is the door of opportunity

- a. This door leads to salvation (v9 shall be saved; John 3:16; Heb. 9:12).
- b. This door leads to blessing (v9-10 find pasture, abundant life; Eph. 1:3).

3. He is the door of access

- a. Suggests security as access is limited; He guards the door and keeps out enemies.
- b. Accessibility He is open or accessible: not secretive or uninviting; announces Himself as the welcoming door (Matt. 11:28-30); sets Himself in contrast to the Pharisees (Matt. 23:13). Open door to all who avail themselves of it (John 10:9, 8:31-32; 2 Pet. 3:9; 1 Tim. 2:4; Mark 16:16).
