The Value of the Assembly

On occasion, someone will ask, "Is it really necessary to attend services on Sunday and/or Wednesday nights?" Perhaps someone else will say, "We are only required to assemble once on the Lord's day." It is the case that some ask such questions or make such statements simply because he is young in the faith and as yet he does not understand the import of his queries. However, it is all too often the case that these questions or statements are put forth by those who should know better, who are seeking justification for their absence from the services. In such instances, there is an insight given into the attitude of the individual—just how little must I do in order to fulfill my obligations to God? Such should never be the attitude of a Christian who is seeking to please God. Rather, our attitudes should be how much can we do for the Lord and His cause? Why should we be faithful to attend all the services of the church? The writer of Hebrews gives some very compelling reasons as to why we should assemble faithfully.

First, we should be faithful in our attendance because God is faithful (Heb. 10:23). When we are sporadic in our attendance, or when we exhibit a lackadaisical attitude toward the assembly, we waver in our profession of faith. Part of that profession of faith is our duty to assemble with the saints. Our failure to assemble is seen by those within and without the church, and, no doubt, speaks to them as to what has, and what does not have, top priority in our lives. Unfaithfulness in assembling is contrary to the character of God, Who is faithful in all things.

Second, we should be faithful in our attendance because of the encouragement it gives to others (10:24). When we fail to assemble, we fail to provoke our brothers and sisters on to love and good works. Not only do we fail God, but we are guilty of impeding the spiritual progress of our brethren (not to mention our own spiritual growth). All Christians need encouragement to continue the good fight of faith, and the assembling of ourselves together provides that opportunity for much needed encouragement.

Third, we should be faithful in our attendance because we know not when our time upon earth will end. We should encourage and seek encouragement from those of like precious faith, in anticipation of that approaching day (vs.25). The Hebrews writer had in mind the destruction of Jerusalem when he wrote about "the day approaching." Christ warned his followers to be on the lookout for the signs that would accompany the downfall of Jerusalem (Mt.24). As the time drew nearer for that day, Christians in Jerusalem needed to encourage one another to remain faithful, so that none would perish in the impending destruction, and so that no one would renounce his faith in light of

Studies for the week of September 11, 2011

Have We Forgotten...

On this tenth anniversary of 9/11/01 many are asking the question, "have we forgetten?", lest we allow the memory of that day fade away. While we certainly mourn for those who lost loved ones and were otherwise affected, it is also important to ask if we have forgotten the spiritual lessons of that day:

- 1. ...the uncertainty of life? this event reminded us of how short life can be and how quickly it can change. Have we remembered the value of time, have we considered our lives, are we diligently watching? (Ps. 90:12; James 4:13-15; 2 Cor. 6:2; 2 Cor .13:5; Rev. 9:20-21; Matt. 24:42-25:46)
- 2. ...our dependance on God? this event caused many to turn to God in prayer, trust, and repentance but did we continue or just pause until the next catastrophe? (Prayer Col. 4:2; 1 Thess. 5:17; Rom. 12:12; 1 Pet. 3:12; Trust Ps. 20:7, 91:2; Matt. 6:19-20, 33; 11:28; Acts 17:27, 30; Heb. 13:5-6; Phil. 4:9; Repentance 2 Cor. 7:10-11; Jer. 10:23; Rom. 12:1-2; James 1:22; 1 Pet. 1:13-16).
- 3. ...love for one another? many gave time, money, food, clothing, and other things to help those who were in need, we celebrated heroes who unselfishly helped others, but did that love continue? Do we still care for those in need, do we still look for oppertunities to help, do we still honor those who give of themselves? (1 Thess. 3:12; Jn. 13:34-35;Matt. 5:46-48; Gal. 6:10; 1 Tim. 6:18; James 1:27; Luke 10:25-37; James 2:15-17)

We would do well to ask ourselves, did our lives truly change in the face of this great tradgedy or did the lessons of that day quickly fade away?(2 Pet. 1:12)

In Search of Refuge (Num. 35:9-29; Heb. 6:17-20)

As the innocent manslayer could flee to the cities of refuge and avoid death, even so we can flee to the church to find refuge...

- **1. Refuge Established**—Six cities were set aside for the protection of any who had accidently killed another (Num. 35:12-15; Josh. 20:7-9); likewise Jesus promised and built His church for any who would flee for refuge (Matt. 16:18, 11:28-30; Acts 10:34-35; 2:16-47).
- 2. Refuge Sought
 - a. **Offence Recognized** he had to recognize his guilt and flee to a city of refuge (Gen 9:6, Deut. 19:6); likewise the sinner must recognize his guilt and flee to refuge, the church (Rom. 6:23; Rev. 12:10; 2 Pet. 3:9-10; 2 Cor. 5:10; Rev. 20:15; Eph. 2:16; 1 John 1:7, 2:1).
 - b. Way Is Clear these cities of refuge were to be made known (Num. 35:14); likewise the place of refuge or salvation has been made known (Matt. 7:13-14, 21; John 14:6; Matt. 28:19-20; John 12:48; Rom. 2:16; Acts 17:30, 2:38, Matt. 10:32-33).
 - c. **Right City Is Critical** Only the identified cities provided safety (Num. 35:12); only the church provides safety (Eph. 1:7; Acts 22:16; Heb. 6:17-20; Rom. 6:23; Eph. 5:23, 1:22-23, 4:4; Matt. 16:18).

3. Refuge Provided

- a. **Safety Granted to Innocent** The manslayer had to be found innocent (Josh. 20:4; Num. 35:24-25; Deut. 19:11-13) but in Christ we are declared innocent (Heb. 8:6; Acts 22:16; Heb. 5:8-9, 9:24).
- b. **Safety Only Inside the City** He had to stay in the city for protection (Num. 35:25-27) and we must remain in the church (John 15:5-6; Heb. 7:25; Heb. 2:1-4; 2 Pet. 2:20-22; Rev. 2:10).
- c. **Blessings Afforded** here he found safety and in Christ we find blessings (Eph. 1:3) (Names of cities: Kadesh=holy (1 Pet. 1:15-16); Shechem=rest (Matt. 11:28-29); Hebron=fellowship (1 Jn 1:3, 7); Bezer=fortress (John 10:28-29); Golan=joy (Phil. 4:4)).
