Stepping Stones For Contentment

The Bible is the divine recipe for human beings to be happy and content. If followed, the Holy Scriptures guarantee a more pleasant journey through this world.

The 37th Psalm provides one with certain "stepping stones" that will make life easier when attempting to wade through the obstacles and difficulties of the day. They are these:

Fret Not! "Fret not thyself because of evil-doers ..." (Psa. 37:1). Such is good advice but very difficult to practice. It is far too common for the godly person to become envious of the evil-doer. Asaph admitted he had almost slipped and fallen because he "was envious at the arrogant, when [he] saw the prosperity of the wicked" (Psa. 73:2-3). It seems that the blessing of contentment has always been difficult for man to achieve.

The apostle Paul addresses contentment in saying, "Not that I speak in respect of want: for I have learned, in whatsoever state I am, therein to be content" (Phil. 4:11). Paul later warns of the danger riches can pose by admonishing: "Be ye free from the love of money; content with such things as ye have" (Heb. 13:5). The lesson to be learned is that all people and especially Christians are not to fret over the many mundane things in this life!

Trust! "Trust in Jehovah, and do good..." (Psa. 37:3). One may claim contentment without trusting in God but such is simply madness. "Without faith it is impossible" to please God (Heb. 11:6), and without pleasing God there can be no legitimate hope to anchor one's soul (Heb. 6:19). Surely one concerned with his soul will not want to be "sluggish [slothful, KJV], but imitators of them who through faith and patience inherit the promises" (Heb. 6:12). The writer refers to the great patriarchs of the Old Testament who are praised for their faithfulness in the eleventh chapter of Hebrews. One will profit who learns that faith and trust in God is evidenced **only** by doing exactly what God said to do!

Delight! "Delight thyself also in Jehovah; and he will give thee the desires of thy heart" (Psa. 37:4). So many claim to delight in God but find themselves far from yielding to His will. If one is not keeping **all** of the Lord's commandments, he should question his love for Him (John 14:15). Trusting in the Father and the Son will cause one to delight in doing their will.

I have set the LORD always before me: because he is at my right hand, I shall not be moved. Therefore my heart is glad, and my glory rejoiceth: my flesh also shall rest in hope.

Psalm 16:8-9

This delight in Jehovah will lead to Him giving one the desires of his heart. Perhaps a better way to think of this is to say that delighting in God and His ways will grant one answers to his prayers that are in accordance with God's will. The Bible teaches that "if we know that he heareth us whatsoever we ask, we know that we have the petitions which we have asked of him" (1 John 5:15). Such is conditional, how-ever, as one must ask "according to his will" to be heard (1 John 5:14).

Commit! "Commit thy way unto Jehovah; trust also in him, and he will bring it to pass" (Psa. 37:5). Partial commitment to God and His ways will not suffice. One scripture demonstrates such in stating, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind" (Matt. 22:37).

The above scripture leaves no wiggle room! It is either all or none and the Lord affirmed this truth in saying, "He that is not with me is against me..." (Matt. 12:30). The principle taught in the Bible is clear: "So therefore whosoever he be of you that renounceth not all that he hath, he cannot be my disciple" (Luke 14:33). The life that is totally committed to God will strive to be free from the anxieties and cares of the world that serve to sidetrack one's loyalty. (Matt. 6:25). Let the faithful learn to cast their cares upon Him who cares for them (1 Pet. 5:7).

Rest! "Rest in Jehovah..." (Psa. 37:7). This will be the end result of the stepping stones already mentioned. The rest comes only by faith, trust, and total commitment to God's plan for man. God is one's refuge and strength (Psa. 46:1), and the victory belongs to Him. The only meaningful rest is in Him!

Cease! "Cease from anger, and forsake

wrath..." (Psa. 37:8). "Strife" and "wrath" are works of the flesh and those "who practice such things shall not inherit the kingdom of God" (Gal. 5:20-21). The wise man warned, "He whose spirit is without restraint is like a city that is broken down and without walls" (Prov. 25:28). One who loves Jehovah and His way will learn to deny self and men. Jesus knew about the battle man would fight with himself and said, "If any man would come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me" (Matt. 16:24). The attitude of the apostle Paul will serve one well in journeying through this life. Paul said, "I have been crucified with Christ; and it is no longer I that live, but Christ living in me: and that life which I now live in the flesh I live in faith, the faith which is in the Son of God, who loved me, and gave himself up for me" (Gal. 2:20).

Wait! "For evil-doers shall be cut off; but those that wait for Jehovah, they shall inherit the land" (Psa. 37:9). In verse 7 something most needed is emphasized — "wait patiently for him." Even after faithful commitment, worship, and service there is still the danger of one growing weary in well-doing (Gal. 6:9; 2 Thess. 3:13). Thus the Hebrews writer pleads, "For ye have need of patience, that, having done the will of God, ye may receive the promise" (Heb. 10:36).

As Christians may we ever be mindful of these stepping stones to contentment, and that in "due season we shall reap, if we faint not" (Gal. 6:9).

Studies for the week of February 10, 2013

Lessons On The Road To Rome (Acts 26-28)

1. Opportunities Abound (26:1; 26:17-18, 22-23; 28:23, 31)

- a. Paul was going to Rome, but not as he had planned, but even in this situation, he still used opportunities to preach. His charge/mission was always the same.
- b. Use opportunities (Acts 8:4; Eph. 5:15-16).

2. All Need The Gospel (26:29)

- a. His desire was in line with God's (1 Tim. 2:4; 2 Pet. 3:9; John 3:16; Luke 19:10).
- b. Do we desire this? Would it be good for them to be as we are? (Matt. 5:16; Phil. 2:15-16; 1 Cor. 11:1; Phil. 4:9)

3. Faithfulness of God (23:12; 27:20-26, 34, 44, 28:16)

- a. Paul trusted in the promises of God even when things seemed bleak and those promises were fulfilled.
- b. One can say like Joseph that God was with him (Acts 7:9); the same the promises to be with us (Heb. 13:5).

4. There Is A Place of Safety (27: 31, 44)

- a. To hope seemed lost, but there was a place of safety if they would stay there, and such is what happened.
- b. Wonderful parallels can be drawn to safety in Christ (Eph. 2:1; Jn. 14:6; Acts 4:12; Gal. 6:9; Heb. 3:14, 4:1).

5. Don't Forget To Be Thankful (27:35)

- a. Imagine: in the midst of anxiety, tired, worn out, hungry, and yet he remembered to thank God for what they had.
- b. How often are we as quick to thank God (Col. 4:2; Luke 17:17-19)?

From The Closet To The Market Place (Colossians 4:2-6)

From the most private part of our lives to the most public aspect, Paul reminds us to live as we ought as children of God.

1. Constant Prayer (4:2-4)

- a. Prayer is something that should be constant, regular, and blended with thanksgiving (Eph. 6:18; Rom. 12:12; Phil. 4:6; 1 Thess. 5:17-18; 1 Tim. 2:1; Luke 18:1). We are to be watchful therein (1 Thess. 5:6; 1 Pet. 5:8).
- b. It is also something that is private (at least in our personal prayer, Matt. 6:5-6), not to be seen of men.

2. Open Christian Walk (4:5)

- a. Our walk is our manner of life (Eph. 4:1; 5:1, 15), that which people see (Phil. 1:27).
- b. The caution here is our appearance to those without that it may be done with wisdom, as a good example. (2 Cor. 3:1-3; 1 Pet. 3:1-2; Phil. 2:15-16). Also use wisdom in considering the use and preciousness of time (Ps. 90:12; James 4:14).

3. Gracious Speech

- a. This is which people hear; use speech that bestows or creates favor (Lk. 4:22); watch consistently for our words will betray us, either for good or bad (Matt. 26:73; 12:34-37; Acts 4:13; James 3:5).
- b. Our words should be that which people need to hear, that which saves, presented in love, even when difficult to hear (Eph. 4:15, 29; 5:4; Heb. 4:12; 1 Pet. 3:15; Jude 3).

Are all aspects of our lives (private & public) pleasing to God?
