The Five W's of Influence

One of the best ways for anyone to fully grasp and appreciate a word, an idea or an event is to use the five "W's" of journalism: what, who, when, where and why.

When Jesus said,

Ye are the light of the world. A city that is set on an hill cannot be hid. Neither do men light a candle, and put it under a bushel, but on a candlestick; and it giveth light unto all that are in the house. Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven. (Matt. 5:14-16)

He was speaking of our influence. Influence is a very integral part of a Christian's life, and this can be clearly seen by using this great tool of journalism.

The "what" of influence. Influence is the power one has in affecting a person or an event. Through our actions and words, we **will** affect others to do this or that, to say this or that or to think this or that. From a scriptural point of view, each Christian has the power to influence others to do good or evil. Whether we influence for good or evil depends on how we live. Influence is a powerful force we use to move others in one direction or another. Most often this powerful force is affecting others unknown to us. "*Ye are the light of the world*" (Matt. 5:14).

The "who" of influence. Whom do we affect through our influence? The ones over whom we have the most influence are our immediate family. Our children watch us like a hawk; they watch our every move and file them in memory. Children are great imitators of their parents, which indicates the powerful influence parents possess. In addition, by what we do (or fail to do) and say (or fail to say), we affect the lives of our neighbors, kinfolk, fellow Christians and most people with whom we come in contact on a daily basis. As adults, we need to be keenly aware of all the little ones in our local congregations who may be looking to us for examples in Christian living. What kind of example are we providing them? "*Ye are the light of the world* [the "who"]" (Matt. 5:14).

The "when" of influence. When do we affect people through our influence? We may have an opportunity at almost any moment. Many times, if not most, we are influencing others without our knowledge. The "when" of influence may come

HE HEARD MY VOICE

Do you ever feel like nobody's listening, or that you have no one to whom to tell your troubles? Isolation seems to be more characteristic of our society. We are surrounded by lonely people, even as the country's population rises, even in the middle of crowded cities, stores, and subdivisions, and even though we are in the "information age." Information does not mean intimacy or communication.

Yet, even when we do have friends and loved ones in our lives, there are some circumstances where their shoulders and ears are not enough. David faced times like that. He recalls some of those times near the end of his reign as second king of Israel. In 2 Samuel 22, he remembers times with Saul and other enemies when he was surrounded, afraid, confronted, and distressed. Have you ever felt that way? What did you do?

David says, "In my distress I called upon the Lord, and cried out to my God; He heard my voice from His temple, and my cry entered His ears" (22:7). Even when we have the attention of someone on earth, we do not have access to the wisdom and power of heaven. God can do what no mortal can. Notice the progression.

First, God heard (7). God is not disinterested when it comes to His children. His ears are open to the righteous (1 Peter 3:12). David had that same confidence at other times in his life (cf. Psalm 65:2). The only thing restricting God's ability to hear the faithful Christian's prayers is that Christian's lack of faithfulness to pray to Him. "Oh, what peace we often forfeit, oh what needless pain we bear, all because we do not carry everything to God in prayer." God intently waits for our prayers. Marlin Connelly once spoke of God's presence with the faithful in Revelation 8:1-4. In explaining the meaning of the silence in heaven for half an hour (1), Connelly commented that it is as if God is saying, "Hush! I'm listening

to the prayers of the saints!" What a thought!

Second, God reacted (8-14). God is not neutral when it comes to His children. Think about it. If you are a parent, are you neutral when it comes to your children? If they are being harassed, if they have problems, or if they are hurting, how does it make you feel? Notice how vividly David, by inspiration, poetically describes God's reaction to how David is being treated. The earth shook and the foundations of heaven quaked. Smoke went up from His nostrils and fire from His mouth. He thundered from heaven, sending out lightning bolts. Why? "Because He was angry" (8). He was angry at how His son David was being treated. Will you remember that God cares that much about you? Such knowledge should make us confident that we can weather any trial that comes!

Finally, God acted (15ff). God is not passive when it comes to His children. He rescued David (17-20) and punished His enemies (15-16). David says he took me, drew me, delivered me, supported me, rewarded me, and delighted in me. Through providence and answered prayer, God acts on our behalf. And think about what He has already done to show He cares (cf. Romans 5:8). Remember a cross? Or a big event on Pentecost (cf. Acts 20:28)? If we pay close attention, God constantly proves His love and concern for us.

Let us not miss David's part in all this. David understood that God's hearing, reacting, and acting on David's behalf was tied to David's manner of life and response to God's love. David heard God (22:21-23). David also acted obediently (22:24-25). Our relationship with the Father cannot be shallow or one-sided. But, what joy to know that even at the lowest, hardest times, if no one else knows, He hears our voice!

The “where” of influence. Where might we be influential? Anywhere! We may be influencing others in the workplace, at home, at the ball game, in school, in the car, in the store or in the worship assembly. Wherever we go, our influence follows. *“Neither do men light a candle, and put it under a bushel, but on a candle stick; and it giveth light unto all the house [the “where”]”* (Matt. 5:15).

The “why” of influence. Why is our influence so important? It is important because many will be saved or lost as a result of our influence. Jesus said, *“But whoso shall offend one of these little ones which believe in me, it were better for him that a millstone were hanged about his neck, and that he were drowned in the depth of the sea”* (Matt. 18:6). It is easy to see why influence is vitally important. *“Therefore let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father [the “why”] which is in heaven”* (Matt. 5:16).

		Wednesday Class Redemption Through The Bible
<p>Psalm 22: Suffering Servant of God <i>The Suffering Servant would know great agony, persecution, and shame; but such would turn to a great victory to the benefit of all!</i></p> <p>1. Perception of Abandonment (v1-2)</p> <p>a. The writer/speaker begins by expressing his overwhelming feeling of being all alone, even from God. These words are uttered by Jesus on the cross in the moment when God could not help Him (Matt. 27:46).</p> <p>b. Yet they may have been more emotion than fact (Jn 8:29; 16:32; Isa. 53:10-12); surely we can know that we don't have to feel this way (1 Pet. 5:7; Heb. 13:5-6).</p> <p>2. Plea for Help (v3-21)</p> <p>a. Though humble and reproached, he knows God has helped before (v3-10). Even in his despair, he recognizes the holiness of God and turns to Him who has before proved His care; he has trusted in the past and will yet trust (Ps. 139; 2 Cor. 1:10). Again consider parallels to Christ's suffering (Matt. 27:39-44; Mk. 15:29-30; Lk. 23:35).</p> <p>b. Therefore he turns to God in his present need (v11-21). He expresses his state and concern to God (Col. 4:2; Heb. 4:14-16). Again parallels Christ's suffering (John 19:23-24,37; Lk. 23:27, 35).</p> <p>3. Praise for God who has Heard and Helped (v22-31)</p> <p>a. Changes to a note of victory; God has heard his cry and aided him; so he will tell others of what God has done and call them to praise Him! (v22-25; Jn 20:1, 17; Heb 2:12; Matt. 28:19-20)</p> <p>b. The world and future generations will hear of what God has done to the glory of His Kingdom. (v26-31) We can rejoice for what God has done and praise Him (Rom. 8::17-18; 2 Tim. 2:11-12), calling others to follow Him (Acts 4:12; John 14:6).</p>	<p>Sowing and Reaping (Galatians 6:7) <i>This verse well summarizes the warnings of the whole book; all need to realize there are consequences to the choices and actions we make in this life, especially spiritual ones.</i></p> <p>1. Be Not Deceived: the warning is against being led away from the right way. It is used this way numerous times throughout the New Testament (deceive: Matt. 24:4-5, 11, 24; 1 Cor. 6:9ff; 1 Jn 1:8; err: Matt. 22:29; James 5:19; astray: Matt. 18:12-13; seduce: 1 John 2:26; wandered: Heb. 11:38; way: Heb. 5:2). They had listened to false teachers that were turning them from the way of truth and the grace of God (1:6-7; 5:4, 7); now they needed to turn back; for there was no hope anywhere else (John 14:6; Acts 4:12; Heb. 4:4-6, 12:1-2; 2 Pet. 2:20-22).</p> <p>2. God Is Not Mocked: This is idea of turning up the nose at, sneering at, or ridiculing (Ps. 2:1ff/Acts 4:25ff). They could not think that God would not notice what they were doing; neither are His warnings to be scoffed at. We are recipients of great promises as those faithful in Christ (2:16; 3:7, 9, 11, 26-29; 4:3-7) but they would forfeit them by turning back. We will not deceive God, only ourselves (James 1:22; Heb. 4:12-13).</p> <p>3. You Reap What You Sow: They needed to determine what they were following after: a perverted Gospel or the gospel of Christ (1:6-7)? Fleshly lusts or the Spirit (5:16ff)? The things of the world or things of God (6:8; 1 John 2:15-17)? They needed to seek and support spiritual things, which if they would do, they would reap a great reward if they grew not weary but continue striving to have Christ formed in them (6:9, 4:19, 5:1; 1 Cor. 15:58; 2 Cor. 5:10; Rom. 8:18; Matt. 25:21; Rev. 2:10).</p>
