### Someone Is Watching You! By Carl B. Garner

Yes, that is right—someone is watching you (and me)—today, right now, and will be watching us tomorrow. I am not talking about someone peeping in our windows, but some are watching us. Every day, people we know, people we do not know, people we may never know—they are watching us to see how we live. They have heard that we are Christians (or claim to be), and they want to see if we are serious about it. They want to know if we are real Christians or just "playing" at being Christians.

This surveillance may make us a bit uneasy, because we realize that we have weaknesses and fail to live consistently with our own standards. However, one of the results of someone professing Christianity is that people want to know if our practice is in harmony with our profession.

Some watch us to catch us in some compromising or hypocritical position. They may want to justify their own behavior by pointing out blemishes in our lives. Others watch because they have respect for our convictions, looking for a positive role model. Whoever we are, many people we do not even know are watching and observing our lives and how we deal with the difficult issues of life.

1. Our children need a good role model. They should be able to follow our example. If they do, will our influence lead them to heaven? That is a tough question, and all parents need to consider it.

2. Our spouses see us. No one knows us as well as they do, and our ways reveal our true character. Let us take a good look—is that how we want friends and fellow -Christians to remember us?

3. Our parents and Bible teachers are watching us. They have read to us from the scriptures; they have taught us the ways of God. They need to have confidence that our lives are on a heavenly course. That would be the very best gift we could leave behind for them.

4. Our friends are watching. They know we are Christians, but they also know if we really mean it when we sing, "O how I love Jesus" and "I want to be a worker for the Lord." Can they have assurance of their roles when they watch our lives?

5. Our brothers and sisters in Christ are watching us. They are not looking for mistakes, but for strength. They need the courage to make good decisions, and they hope to see them in our daily lives.

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But continue thou in the things which thou hast learned and hast been assured of, knowing of whom thou hast learned them; And that from a child thou hast known the holy scriptures, which are able to make thee wise unto salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus.

### Trials Can Bring Joy

No one really likes problems. In fact, most people go out of their way to avoid problems. Of course, they usually just create a whole different set of problems as a result, but such is our distaste for the trials of life. The apostle Paul tells us, *"There hath no temptation taken you but such as is common to man: but God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able; but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear it" (1 Cor. 10:13). While trials of various kinds—illness, financial problems, family issues, and even church situations—are never fun, they can still bring joy if we approach them the right way.* 

**Trials help us grow in character and therefore mature us spiritually.** James told early Christians, who experienced a number of various problems, "My brethren, count it all joy when ye fall into divers temptations; Knowing this, that the trying of your faith worketh patience. But let patience have her perfect work, that ye may be perfect and entire, wanting nothing" (Jas. 1:2-4). James did not tell these Christians that they should enjoy trials. He told them to see the big picture when they undergo them. We often allow trials to take over our lives so much that they are all we can see. Instead, we should see these problems as opportunities by which we can grow in character. It does not mean that the issues disappear, but it does mean that we are determined to make the most of them spiritually, and that can bring us joy.

**Trials teach us endurance and therefore have spiritual value.** James continued his thought by concluding, "Blessed is the man that endureth temptation: for when he is tried, he shall receive the crown of life, which the Lord hath promised to them that love him" (Jas. 1:12). He returned to this theme as he closed his epistle as well: "Behold, we count them happy which endure. Ye have heard of the patience of Job, and have seen the end of the Lord; that the Lord is very pitiful, and of tender mercy" (Jas. 5:11). When we undergo trials and temptation upon the earth, we must learn to see beyond the immediate problem to what God has promised us in the end. True bliss lies not in life being easy but in the difficulties of lie being overcome. When we endure trials, we lift ourselves above them. When we learn to look beyond the trial itself to see what has lasting value, we learn to look forward to eternity in hope rather than allowing the problem of the moment to define us.

Trials force us to focus more on the spiritual and more on eternity, and that is a good thing. The apostle Peter spoke about trials of suffering throughout his first epistle, noting that Christians can rejoice in their hope despite the trials of today (1 Pet. 1:6), that enduring trials for spiritual reasons allows Christians to rejoice in pleasing God despite the pain (1 Pet. 3:14; cf. Acts 5:41), and that to do such is a mark of Christianity (1 Pet. 4:13-14). Throughout, the apostle emphasizes that trials define this life and that, for a Christian, joy defines the next. When we try to avoid the difficulties of this life, we will not be able to enjoy the joys of heaven because we are unprepared for them and will not appreciate them. Trials remind us that we are living in the present but not for the present. We are living for eternity, and the joy that awaits us there can bring us joy today when we keep it in our focus. Trials can benefit others and therefore bring us joy when they matter to us. The apostle Paul told the Colossians that he was able to find joy in his sufferings for (Continued on page 3)

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6. Jesus is watching us. He faced the same kind of temptations we are facing now. He endured temptation and torture and scorn because of His love for us. He died on the cross for us. Do our lives say, "I love you Lord, and I want to do your will" or, "Leave me alone, I want to do my own thing"?

Even when we think no one is watching, God is watching, and many others are, many of whom we may never meet. We may think we are unimportant, that no one notices us. But no one "lives to himself, and no man dies to himself" (Rom. 14:7). Our example today could be the very example that someone follows tomorrow. We must remember who and what we are, and whose we are. We belong to Him, and what a blessing that is! Yes, someone is watching you...and it may even be me.

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them (Col. 1:24). To put this into perspective, we should consider childbirth. Labor and giving birth has never been described as a pleasant experience, yet women everywhere gladly endure it, both for the sake of their children and their husbands. Thus, a difficult experience can bring great benefit and joy to others and therefore bring us joy as well. It sometimes takes a great deal of time and effort to teach someone the gospel, including regular studies over many weeks and sometimes an emotional roller coaster. However, all of that is soon forgotten when the person obeys the gospel. The time and effort are no longer at the forefront; the salvation of a soul is. This then brings great joy for the benefit made possible through all the time and effort. It can be hard to accept during the process, but in retrospect even the difficulties of the work can bring joy.

Trials themselves do not present themselves as joyous occasions. However, our attitude toward them can change that. When we remember how much we have to gain by properly handling such trials, even these can offer us the prospect of joy.
