I Hope the World Hates My Son

As a 5-year-old, I remember my parents asking me what I wanted to be when I grew up. My answer, of course, was "a school bus driver." For some reason, that career choice never materialized. But I ended up doing the next best thing – being a preacher.

This past January I found out I am going to be a father, and this month I found out he will be a boy. Lord willing he will arrive mid-September. Now my imagination about the future is going wild. I'm finding that my hopes and dreams about the future are beginning to revolve more around my son than they are with me. What will he be when he grows up? Will he be a smart, straight-A student? Will he be funny and popular? Will he be an impressive specimen of health, charm, and style, like his dad? I suppose I will just have to wait and find out.

I daydream about my son being well behaved and pleasant when he is around others. I want his teachers to be impressed by his intelligence and the respect he gives them. I want his coaches to admire his dedication to the team. I want his employers to be surprised by the positive attitude and hard-work ethic he brings to the workplace. I want him to have a healthy influence on his peers and to be a role model to the generation that follows him. I want him to break the mold by being a true leader and example to others. Maybe this is just my pride, but I want to be proud of him. I want him to succeed, and I want to be the father, along with his mother, who will set him up for that success.

I don't think my hopes are unique; I think every [good] parent has big dreams about who their children will be. At the same time, I never want to confuse worldly achievement with spiritual success. More than I want my child to be popular and make good grades, I want him to become a strong and courageous Christian.

Because we have a different allegiance and value system than the world, Christian parents must put the dreams they have for their children in the context of <u>John 15:19</u>: "If you were of the world, the world would love you as its own; but because you are not of the world, but I chose you out of the world, therefore the world hates you."

Above all, I want my son to be faithful to the Lord. And if my prayers and hopes are answered, the world will hate him. Without a doubt, some people will be completely disgusted with him.

I want my son to know there is a Creator, and that his purpose is to serve Him (Ecc. 12:13). I want my son to know that God's Word is inerrant and sufficient (Matt. 24:35; 2 Tim. 3:16-17), being the very map to heaven (2 Tim. 3:15). I want him to know that there is a right way and a wrong way to worship God, and that everything must be done by the authority of Christ (Col. 3:17). I want him to know about God's plan for human sexuality (Matt. 19:1-12), and that he is to be unshakably committed to his wife (Eph. 5:25). I want him to be a gentle and loving parent (Eph. 6:4). I want him to know that pornography is wicked (Matt. 5:27-30), and that women need to be treated with respect (1 Tim. 5:2). I want him to love the church of Jesus Christ more than his own life (Matt. 16:18; Eph. 5:28; Acts 20:28), being wholeheartedly dedicated to preserving the church just as she is found in the New Testament (Eph. 5:27). I want him to be eager to share the gospel with others (Matt. 28:19-20), zealous to contend for the faith (Jude 3), and willing to stand against error (2 Tim. 4:2). I want him to be a bright example of Christ's love to our dark and dreary world (Matt. 5:13-16; John 13:35).

In turn, the world will call him a bigot and a homophobe for not endorsing homosexuality. Secular academia will call him ignorant and close-minded for not believing in evolution and the "big bang." His peers will mock him for being "old-fashioned" for not having sex before marriage. So-called Christians will ridicule him for not worshiping with instruments and refusing to compromise with denominations. The world will call him "judgmental" for calling sin what it is: sin. Weak Christians will tease him for not laughing at wicked entertainment and will deride him for attending every worship service (even if it means pulling his kids out of baseball practice). And the world will scratch its head when he responds to all of this in love.

I hope the world will hate him. Because if Hannah and I raise him in the Way of the Lord, the world will certainly know he is not one of them (John 7:7; 17:14-17). He will definitely feel its hatred.

When the world sees you as an abomination, God calls you righteous (Prov. 29:27). And that is true success.

The Value of Endurance—Part One

Sometimes we act like being a Christian should be easy, that discipleship is some cushy job with great perks. Discipleship offers great blessings, but there is a difference. True discipleship practically guarantees great resistance and open hostility. Jesus Himself warned the apostles, "Do not think that I came to bring peace on earth. I did not come to bring peace but a sword" (Mt. 10:34). Our Lord knew the nature of the discipleship to which He calls us, as much as He knew the path He Himself faced marching toward the cross (Lk. 9:22). He understood its struggles and its heartaches. He considered its adversity and pain. Nevertheless, to this He called us, because the hardships of life and the challenges created by a heartless enemy (1 Pet. 5:8), can yet refine our character.

Therefore, disciples must consider how prepared they are to endure the onslaught of open negativity, unwarranted criticism, and irrational arguments the world will throw their direction. Jesus reminds us, "A disciple is not above his teacher, nor a servant above his master. It is enough for a disciple that he be like his teacher, and a servant like his master. If they have called the master of the house Beelzebub, how much more will they call those of his household!" (Mt. 10:24-25). Perhaps we have enjoyed relative peace in this world for too long. If so, the devil simply has lulled us to sleep. The vitriol spewed forth against the Bible and morality in recent years should fortify our faith rather than cause us to shrink away. Satan has not called a truce! He is still fighting—even while knowing his defeat. Like something injured in the wild, he does not accept it well. To the contrary, he lashes out at anything and everything around him. Christians must prepare themselves for this, including attacks from those claiming some affinity to Christ (2 Cor. 11:14-15). Disciples must therefore strengthen themselves to withstand these assaults on their faith, to hold fast despite insults to their intelligence, and hang on regardless of how much the world turns against the truth. The world does not value faith because it does not value Christ. But take heart, Jesus still values your endurance.

estimating their own value and trying to insulate themselves from attack. This only leads to compromise. Some Christians act as if their strength and faithfulness needs no improvement. They place themselves at the pinnacle of knowledge and spirituality and consider this self-built fortress sufficient protection from the tempter's fiery darts. They are wrong. They have forgotten the experience of one Simon Peter. On the night of Jesus' betrayal, "Having arrested Him, they led Him and brought Him into the high priest's house. But Peter followed at a distance. Now when they had kindled a fire in the midst of the courtyard and sat down together, Peter sat among them. And a certain servant girl, seeing him as he sat by the fire, looked intently at him and said, 'This man was also with Him.' But he denied Him, saying, 'Woman, I do not know Him.' And after a little while another saw him and said, 'You also are of them.' But Peter said, 'Man, I am not!' Then after about an hour had passed, another confidently affirmed, saying, 'Surely this fellow also was with Him, for he is a Galilean.' But Peter said, 'Man, I do not know what you are saying!' Immediately, while he was still speaking, the rooster crowed. And the Lord turned and looked at Peter. Then Peter remembered the word of the Lord, how He had said to him, 'Before the rooster crows, you will deny Me three times.' So Peter went out and wept bitterly" (Lk. 22:54-62). Judas followed Jesus for more than three years but failed completely in the end. Our value as disciples cannot be accurately measured at any one point in life—no matter how active, knowledgeable, or spiritual we may seem. As proved by the life of Jesus Himself, the only proper measurement of a given person's spiritual value will be of His spiritual endurance, and that valuation will be determined only after death (Phil. 2:5-11; Heb. 9:27).

Studies for the week of June 1, 2014

Studies in Luke—The Rich Man & Lazarus—16:19-31

The setting is still the same as begin in 15:1.

A parable or actual events? The answer does not really affect the message, unless one tries to allegorize the message away.

Characters

- A rich man—he dressed in purple and feasted sumptuously every day.
- ◆ Lazarus—a beggar, covered with sores, laid at the gate of the rich man desiring only the crumbs from the rich man's table.

Conflicts

- ◆ In a significant turn of events both men die, unveiling the real character of each and the condition of the souls.
- ◆ The rich man is buried—probably with much ceremony.
 - ♦ However he finds himself in torment:
 - He sees Lazarus in comfort, contrasting his torment.
 - ♦ He is in anguish in the flames and in need of water.
 - He has agonizing memories of his family and Lazarus.
 - ♦ He realizes his state is eternal and unchangeable.
 - ♦ He is unable to help his brothers
- ♦ Lazarus—is at Abraham's side and comforted
 - ♦ It must be implied that Lazarus was a man of faith (people are not saved or lost merely by economic status).

The Final Insult

- ◆ The rich man's final request, while appearing noble, implies that it is God's fault he is in torment—he did not have sufficient warning.
- The rich man is one of several in our study taken by surprise.

When our Lord comes as a thief in the night, will he find you ready? Or will He take you by surprise?

Sunday Class What Must I Do To Be Saved?
Wednesday Class Mark 10

Epistle of James—Admonition to Teachers (2)—3:13-18

◆ After mentioning the teacher in v. 1, James discusses the more specific subject of the tongue's influence and evil. Now he goes back to the subject of the teacher.

Those Who Should Not Teach (13,14)

- Since a teacher has a reputation of more skill and knowledge than others, he should show by his conduct that it is, in fact, true.
- We should teach with meekness and gentleness.
- ♦ James shows four characteristics of wrong teaching:
 - ◆ Fanatical—not based on sound reasoning.
 - ♦ Bitter—regards its opponents as enemies rather than friends to be helped.
 - ♦ Selfishly Ambitious—more interested in showing off knowledge than showing truth.
 - ◆ Arrogant—pride in knowledge rather than humility in ignorance
- ♦ "What you are speaks so loudly that I cannot hear what you say."

The Wrong Kind of Wisdom (15,16)

- ♦ The wisdom described in v. 14 is not from God, but is earthly, unspiritual, demonic.
- ♦ This type wisdom is worthless for bring one to Christ.
- It drives people apart and produces strife, rather than bringing people together and producing peace.

True Wisdom (17,18)

- ◆ The foundation for true wisdom is purity (freedom from these undesirable traits.
- ♦ One then builds on that foundation, peaceable, gentle, open to reason, full of mercy and good fruits, impartial and sincere.
- If the teacher sows in peace, he can expect a great harvest.
