The Truth About "Safe Sin"

According to the name I scribbled on the page, the two quotes that follow are from the pen of Mike Jackson. He says: I like coming up with oxymorons. These are expressions or statements which are apparently self-contradictory but make a point nonetheless. Some examples are: 'cruel kindness,' 'heavy lightness.' And some on the lighter note include: 'clean dirt,' and 'tough love.' As a rule, these words just do not go together.

I shall add another one to the list, 'safe sin.' Please let me explain. These are 'good' sins (there's another one). Acceptable sins, sins that are laughed about! If put to a vote, these would be removed from the list of sins altogether.

It is obvious that the world in which we live would like nothing better than to vote certain "sins" out of the realm of sinfulness! Our government evidently decided long ago that it would become the expert on sin, and now it informs us about the so-called "social ills" of society. The psychologists and sociologists have influenced most folks more than the Bible, thus, sin has now become a disorder, a disease, a fault of one's own heredity, etc. Never mind that the inspired Word of God says that sin is "lawlessness" (ASV) or "transgression of the law" (KJV) (cf. 1 John 3:4)! It does not matter with most that they must ignore the fact that the Bible declares, "the wages of sin is death" (Rom. 6:23). And, since some one or some thing can always be conveniently blamed for one's acts and condition, it would be unthinkable to think "the soul that sinneth, it shall die" (Ezek. 18:20). Since, according to worldly wisdom on human behavior, changes must continually occur in the way folks think and act, it would be a total surprise to learn that the Bible states, "For ever, O LORD, thy word is settled in heaven" (Psa. 119:89). In other words, sin has always been just that, sin, and always will be! Nothing that man can do or say will change this Biblical truth. At the great Day of Judgment, every soul will be reminded that Christ compassionately warned, "He that rejecteth me, and receiveth not my words, hath one that judgeth him: the word that I have spoken, the same shall judge him in the last day" (John 12:48).

The world has indeed "done a number" on most people's thinking. How many people do you know who simply smile upon hearing a filthy joke? What about one eagerly listening to another tell of their sinful encounter? How often do you hear of someone referring to a person's sinful action as "cute?" Or, one may exclaim, "It's just the way that boys/girls are today." Another boldly declares, "We are living in the 2000s, not the 30s or 40s." Someone else says, "society has changed," as if such an explanation makes sin acceptable today. The wisdom of the world would have one believe that the passage of time changes everything. Such is the devil's lie. There is no truth in what Satan says (cf. John 8:44). God never changes (Malachi 3:6), and His word/truth will never "pass away" (Mark 13:31).

From the beginning of time, sin has been the problem of man (Gen. 3:1-19, 22-24). It is sin that separates one from God. Isaiah recorded, "Behold, the Lord's hand is not shortened, that it cannot save; neither his ear heavy, that it cannot hear: But your iniquities have separated between you and your God, and your sins have hid [his] face from you, that he will not hear" (59:1-2). Sin will not change, and neither will the truth that sin separates one from God change! People who commit the sins this world has deemed to be "normal" and "acceptable behavior," glamorous and exciting, will one day learn "that they who do such things shall not inherit the kingdom of God" (Gal. 5:21).

Listen carefully, no matter what one chooses to believe, there is no such thing as "safe sin!" The high price of sin is the devil's best-kept secret! Sin is always costly, but the devil will attempt to

The Facts Concerning Jesus' Sacrifice

iving up what is valuable is called a sacrifice. However, in order for a sacrifice to be of any merit, the one sacrificing must experience the effects of that which is given up. When God sacrificed His Son for our sins, He viewed our spiritual condition to be important; thus the life of His Son was offered. Paul demonstrated this point to the Corinthians: "For he hath made him to be sin for us, who knew no sin" (2 Cor. 5:21). Jesus became that propitiation or satisfaction the Lord God needed in order to be appeased (1 John 2:2).

In the Old Testament, the sacrifices of bulls and goats were required for the sins of the people. Furthermore, at times they were even commanded to offer bloodless sacrifices unto God for His appeasement (Lev.1-4). However, these sacrifices (under the Mosaic system) were never intended to take away sin; they were to be used until the sacrifice of Christ (Heb. 10:1 -10). In addition, the sacrifices of old could not cleanse the conscience from the guilt of sin; hence, the sacrifice of Christ was necessary (Heb. 9:9; 14-15). Therefore, the question must be proposed, "How does a sinful man approach a Holy God?" The answer: through the sacrifice of Jesus Christ. This is the only way to the Father for life (John 14.6).

There are many facts concerning the sacrifice of Christ. His sacrifice was a sweet savor to the Lord (Eph. 5.2). This statement is paramount. What Jesus freely did for mankind was unprecedented and must not be overlooked. Jesus always did that which pleased the Father, so God made Him our Lord and Christ (Acts 2.36). This was not an afterthought—God knew man was going to sin and responded to the dreadful act instead of reacting. His sacrifice was determined before the foundation of the world (Rev. 13:8). Unlike Old Testament sacrifices, His was offered once for all time for sin (Heb. 9:12, 10:12). Upon completion, the Lord was raised from the dead and appeared to many for forty days (1 Cor. 15). Because of His obedience to God, He ascended to the Father and was given existence at the right hand of God (Dan. 7:13-14; Heb. 1:3).

Furthermore, Jesus, "though he was rich, yet for [our] sakes he became poor, that [we] through his poverty might be rich" (2 Cor. 8:9). He gave up the glories of heaven and became man to identify with us (Phil. 2:5-11). He endured the hardship of a mock trial and unwarranted scourging, not because of any sin He ever committed, but because of ours (Matt. 26:47-27:56).

Jesus was that sacrificial Lamb spoken of by Isaiah the prophet. He was the One smitten by God and afflicted before the foundation of the world (53:4-5). Peter lets us know in no uncertain terms that He committed no sin, neither was deceit found in His mouth. This alone tells of the mindset of Christ. Imagine taking on the offences of those who were not concerned for your welfare. This was heart-wrenching to our Lord, as was seen in the Garden of Gethsemane as He was praving earnestly to the Father in heaven (Matt. 26:36-46).

Many would ask, "Why is this important?" Jesus became our Passover Lamb (1 Cor. 5:7). Just as in the days of the Egyptians, when the Lord had the Israelites put blood upon the doorpost for their deliverance, Jesus' sacrifice ensures us of forgiveness and cleansing from sin when we are immersed into Christ (Ex. 12:21-30; Heb. 9:14-15). Consider this, the families during the time before the Exodus had to pick out a lamb, kill it, roast it, and place the blood in the proper place according to God's standard. When God saw the blood, He would then pass over. God chose His own Passover Lamb in the person of Christ, and when He sees the blood that came from His Son's side, then He is appeased (Ex. 12:13; John 19:34).

In closing, let us never forget what the Lord did for us some two thousand years ago when He bore our sins in His body upon the tree (1 Pet. 2:24-25). A scourging that should have killed Him before He made it to the cross became our entryway to glory and ultimately eternal life. We can truly say, "By His stripes we are healed." Even though our Lord was badly beaten, even though He was struggling from every emotion imaginable, He teaches us a valuable lesson in His sacrifice: have the will to make it to the end despite the opposition, the suffering, and the stress. One is brought to tears when considering the entirety of what the Lord went through in order for us to have an opportunity for eternal life. Jesus gave self up for that which was greater-our salvation. Jesus taught us about true sacrifice and how it hurts at times in order that others may benefit. Jesus teaches us, that it is okay to bear the wrong for the right reason. Jesus teaches us, how to please the Superior One-God. And finally, Jesus teaches us that God has the final s`ay and He will exalt the righteous in due time.
