Kernels of Knowledge From our Daily Bible Reading The Time of the Judges of Israel

With the Promised Land conquered and allotted to the respective tribes, a day God's chosen people had long anticipated was at hand. Six centuries earlier God had promised that Abraham's descendents would become a nation and possess this land. Now the fulfillment of that promise had been realized. While the people had been in Egypt, they no doubt had longed for the day when they would have their own land. In Egypt they had been foreigners and even slaves, and then in the wilderness they had been restless transients. But now they were in a land of their own. They could plan for the future and carve out their own manner of life.

It was also a day of great promise. In that Israel had been raised up by God to be His special people, and in that God would desire such a people to be a fine witness to His glory, there was reason for Israel to anticipate success and prosperity. God indeed had clearly promised unusual blessing, stating that if the people followed Him faithfully, they would be "the head and not the tail" in their world community and so "you shall only go up and not down" (Deut. 28:1-14; 30:1-10). All that the Israelites needed to do was obey their heavenly Ruler and the most attractive future ever enjoyed by a nation awaited.

This grand future did not come to pass, however, because the people did not meet the condition. They did not remain true to their God or obey His laws. These wonderful blessings, therefore, were forfeited.

While the Book of Judges is history, it is history of a particular type. Its point of view is that God rewards faithfulness to His covenant with peace and prosperity in the land, but punishes faithlessness with oppression by other nations. This basic theme must be understood if its message is to be appreciated. The key word for Judges is "failure"-the failure of Israel to live up to her God-given obligation.

A key verse, written twice (Judg. 17:6; 21:25), sounds this note: "Everyone did what was right in his own eyes." The book shows how this was tragically true. The rationale for this type of historical report is found in the need to tell why Israel was not blessed by God as she might have been. She, who had owned such attractive prospects, did not realize them because she did not obey her God. The book depicts the many ways she failed.

Chapter 1 describes Israel's failure to drive the Canaanites from the land. Chapter 2 tells of her consequent acceptance of Canaanite Baal worship. Chapter 3 through 16 depict periods of oppression, brought as punishment, by Mesopotamians, Moabites, Canaanites, Midianites, Ammonites, and Philistines. Each period involved a cycle of Israel sinning, being invaded and severely oppressed, and then delivered by a judge raised up by God. Finally, chapters 17 through 21 narrate two sad episodes which illustrate the depths of religious, moral, and political degeneracy which generally characterized the period.


Even though this motif of failure dominates the book, it is not necessary to assume that the rebellious behavior described here was characteristic of all Israelites. It may not have been normative and certainly was not legally proper. We should be reminded that, while the depressing series of events recorded in Judges was taking place, at the same time the people of Bethlehem were living out apparently quiet lives governed by law. The idyllic account of Ruth, with the trust in God's providence that underlies it, provides the other side of the coin and reminds us that, at her worst, Israel still contained people for whom the Law and their relationship with God was important.

Can We Handle Our Blessings?

Since Satan is always putting obstacles in our way, we should pray that the Lord will be with us in our challenges because the Christian life is very difficult (Matt. 6:34).

While it may seem an unexpected question, should we pray for our blessings in the same way?

God blesses us immeasurably if we're in Christ (Ezek. 34:26; Eph. 1:3). He wants to open the windows of heaven for his faithful children (Malachi 3:10). But with blessings come responsibility.

Hezekiah was a godly man who expelled idols and brought God's will to the land (2 Kings 18:1-8). Years later, he was near death and he begged God for more time and the Lord granted him fifteen more years (2 Kings 20:1-6).

However, Hezekiah repaid the Lords' grace and mercy by refusing to give God credit for his wealth and God brought a curse on his household (Isaiah 39).

Earlier in their history, Israel had God's guidance and protection in the wilderness but they rejected it (Numbers 11:1-14).

Blessings are a challenge, as well. Not everyone can handle them.

We allow the flesh to bring in vanity, ingratitude, selfishness and a host of other sins. God provides for us but he won't do it by the standards of the wealthy and ungodly.

Therefore, brethren, let us constantly pray that we will develop the proper attitudes about our blessings.

How can we do that?

- Allow the gospel to transform our expectations (Romans 12:1-2).
- Develop spiritual vision by focusing on heaven (John 14:1-6).
- Develop a humble spirit (James 4:10).
- Develop a less materialistic mindset (Matthew 6:33).

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We can easily take God's gifts for granted and think that God owes us for our allegiance. However, that is absurd (Acts 17:25). God hates ingratitude so we must always pray that we will be attentive and grateful for the blessings God gives us because he can always take them away.
