Four Ways to Be a Stronger Christian

The Christian life is a life of transformation. In Romans 12:2 Paul said, "And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God." The transforming process takes both time and effort. It requires spiritual growth just as babies require physical growth. In 1 Peter 2:1-3 we find, "Therefore, laying aside all malice, all deceit, hypocrisy, envy, and all evil speaking, as newborn babes, desire the pure milk of the word, that you may grow thereby, if indeed you have tasted that the Lord is gracious." Babies grow one day at a time and it is the same for the spiritual growth of Christians. There is no shortcut to instant spiritual maturity. Being a Christian requires a lifetime commitment to growth (2 Peter 3:18). Ezra 7:10 explains, "For Ezra had prepared his heart to seek the Law of the Lord, and to do it, and to teach statutes and ordinances in Israel." From this verse we find four principles which we must follow to become stronger Christians.

First, we must prepare our hearts. Preparing our hearts requires the right attitude of submission to God's commands. When one of the scribes asked about the first commandment Jesus said, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength" (Mark 12:29-30). We must be dedicated to obedience with our entire being. How we care for our hearts is very important. Proverbs 4:23 states, "Keep your heart with all diligence, for out of it spring the issues of life." If we do not fully prepare our hearts to serve God we will always struggle in our faithfulness.

Second, we must "seek the law of the Lord." This means we should search for a greater knowledge and a better understanding of God's word. A strong faith requires knowledge. We need an accurate understanding of the commandments of God. In Psalm 119:10-12 the writer said, "With my whole heart I have sought You; oh, let me not wander from Your commandments! Your word I have hidden in my heart, that I might not sin against You. Blessed are You, O Lord! Teach me Your statutes." God's commandments are so precious that we should seek them with complete eagerness and enthusiasm (Psalm 119:127). God's word is of such great value because it leads us to eternal life. [Jesus] explains, "Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal; but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Matthew 6:19-21). The only way we can

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truly understand God's word is to study. 2 Timothy 2:15 dividing the word of truth."

Third, we must obey the things commanded by God. Knowing God's word is vital but if we do not obey the teaching, our knowledge will be of no value. In James 1:22 we find, "But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving yourselves." Proclaiming our faith must be backed-up with action. Jesus asked in Luke 6:46, "But why do you call Me 'Lord, Lord,' and not do the things which I say?" If we love Christ we will obey His commands.

Fourth, we must teach the truth to others. In Mark 16:15-16 Jesus said, "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. He who believes and is baptized will be saved; but he who does not believe will be condemned." We must prepare ourselves to teach others about God. We must be ready to give a good Bible answer to those who ask us about spiritual things. Peter said, "But sanctify the Lord God in your hearts, and always be ready to give a defense to everyone who asks you a reason for the hope that is in you, with meekness and fear" (1 Peter 3:15). Paul told Timothy that he had a responsibility to teach the things he had learned to others. In 2 Timothy 2:2 he said, "And the things that you have heard from me among many witnesses, commit these to faithful men who will be able to teach others also."

So, in Ezra 7:10 we find four principles which help us to be stronger Christians. Ezra had prepared his heart to seek the law of the Lord, and to do it, and to teach in Israel statutes and judgments. If we follow his example, we will become stronger in our faith and better Christians. We must work in these four areas so that we might grow in our faith and become spiritually mature servants of Christ.

The Sermon on the Mount: Raising the Standard

After describing what citizens of His kingdom should look like in the Beatitudes and then explaining how His followers should interact with the world around them (salt and light), Jesus now moves forward in Matthew 5:17-48 to relate life in the kingdom to the Old Testament Law.

Jesus begins by saying that He came not to abolish the Law or the Prophets, but to fulfill them (5:17). The Law and the Prophets make up two of the main sections of Hebrew Scriptures, so Jesus here is basically referring to the entirety of the Old Testament.

Within Churches of Christ, we have sometimes been guilty of emphasizing so strongly that we are "New Testament Christians" - meaning that we are saved under the new covenant and that we enter that covenant as described in the pages of the New Testament - that we have given the impression that we don't think the Old Testament matters very much.

But just so we're clear, the Old Testament matters to us as Christians, a lot! Jesus says He came not to abolish the Old Testament, but to fulfill it: not only did Jesus follow the Law in His own life, He also fulfilled its prophecies, and accomplished its purpose.

Jesus goes on to tell His audience that unless their righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and the Pharisees – the well-respected religious leaders of the day – they will be unable to enter His kingdom (5:20). This helps us to clearly see an important point: rather than getting rid of the Law and letting people do whatever they want now that they are free of it, Jesus actually raises the standards of how people in His kingdom will live. In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus calls His followers to the highest standards of moral and ethical conduct that the world has ever known.

Moving forward, Jesus will illustrate how the righteousness of His followers must exceed that of the scribes and the Pharisees by bringing up six different areas related to the Law. Each time, He will begin by saying, "You have heard that it was said...but I say to you." When Jesus says this, He is not disagreeing with or contradicting the Law itself, but rather, is setting His interpretation of the Law up against the way the scribes and Pharisees interpreted it. Jesus came to fulfill the Law, not to abolish it, but that doesn't mean that He is beholden to the traditions of men. As the "New Moses" who delivers God's Law anew and as the one who is God with Us Himself, Jesus is the Divine Interpreter of the Law who gets to tells us what it means and how it applies.

We do not have the time to look at each of these six areas in detail, but Jesus relays a similar message time and time again:

• Murder and Anger (5:21-26): Jesus says it isn't enough not to murder someone; it's also improper for us to hold anger against our brothers and sisters and insult them. Furthermore, when we are at odds with one another, reconciliation is so important that it even takes priority over worship!

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- Adultery and Lust (5:27-30): Jesus says it isn't enough to refrain from committing the physical act of adultery; it is also inappropriate to lust after other people. Lust is a particularly dehumanizing and selfish sin because it treats the other person as an object whose worth is only determined by their ability to fulfill your desires. We live in a culture that has a major problem with the objectification of women in particular, and in this climate, Jesus says it's not enough to simply avoid the physical act of sexual immorality; we are also to control our minds and avoid the dehumanizing act of lust.
- **Divorce** (5:31-32): Divorce was a hotly-debated topic in Jesus' day, and He sides with the strictest interpreters of the law, saying that anyone who divorces except for sexual immorality makes their spouse commit adultery (because the assumption is that both parties will get married again).
- Oaths (5:33-37): The Old Testament was clear that God's people were to be truthful, but over time, this had been perverted to the point that elaborate rules had been developed for ways you could make an oath or a vow, and that only oaths that contained God's name were binding. Jesus condemns this practice as ridiculous, and basically points out that the only reason that people would feel the need to take an oath to get people to believe them would be if their word in general was suspect. However, if we have a track record of being honest with other people, no oaths or vows are necessary. And this is precisely Jesus' point: don't make vows, but simply say "Yes" or "No" and be honest when you say them. The standard for living in Jesus' alternative community is absolute integrity and honesty, no elaborate oaths or half-truths.
- Retaliation (5:38-42): The Old Testament teaches the law of retribution (an eye for an eye) in multiple places as a legal principle to insure that fair compensation was made for any wrong that was done, but apparently the religious leaders of Jesus' day had extended this principle to personal relationships. Jesus makes it clear that this sort of retaliation is unacceptable for those who would follow Him, and using four examples from the present day, emphasizes that citizens of the kingdom operate out of interest for others rather than self-interest. We are to prefer nonresistance over retaliation, generosity over legal rights, and concern for others over concern for ourselves. We are to respond to oppressive behavior with the love of God.
- Love Your Enemies (5:43-48): The Law of Moses certainly taught the necessity of loving one's neighbor (Leviticus 19:18), but the hating of one's enemy was an inference made by those who wanted to limit the requirement to love. But Jesus says that His followers are not to treat enemies as enemies, but as people we love.

This concludes one of the most difficult sections of the Sermon on the Mount, difficult not because it is hard for us to understand, but because it is so hard for us to follow. Some of the things Jesus says here seem so extreme that it is tempting to say that what Jesus commands is impractical and would never work in the "real world." But remember: Jesus doesn't call His disciples to fit into the "real world": He calls us to change it by living as salt and light, faithful members of an alternative community.

The Challenge of Following Jesus (Matthew 8:18-22) In our text, we find Jesus responding to two individuals regarding the matter of discipleship.

- . The hasty scribe who needed to count the cost of discipleship.
- The hesitant man who needed to learn what it means to be a disciple.
- One Must Be Willing to Count the Cost.
 - A. The Scribe's Offer "I will follow You wherever You go."

In an age of easy believism, do not forget "The Challenge of Following Jesus".

This is one of the paradoxes of Christianity: the salvation that Jesus offers is a free gift, but it comes at a high cost.

Have you counted the cost? Are you willing to pay the price? Both are required to follow Jesus!

Trust Psalms - Psalm 23 - "Satisfied with God" No indications are given concerning the time or circumstances of writing. This psalm has been called "The Pearl of the Psalms."

The relationship with God is described as an intensely personal one. We learn that true peace is rooted in an unwavering fellowship with God.

The Faithful Shepherd (1-4).

- A. "The LORD is my shepherd" pictures the sustaining relationship a shepherd has with his sheep.
- B. "I shall not want" I will not lack for anything.
- C. "He makes me to lie down in green pastures" the child of God shall not want for sustenance.
- D. "He leads me beside the still waters" "waters at rest" a quite pool away from the hurry and worry of life.
- E. "He restores my soul" "He returns my soul to me" God gives His children reassurance when they are discouraged and disheartened.
- F. "He leads me in the paths of righteousness" the follower of God will not want for direction and guidance.
- G. "For His name's sake" for the honor of His name, God leads His own.
- H.God's people do not lack companionship even in the toughest times -"Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil; for You are with me.
 - The shepherd walks near to steer them past dangerous places.
 - David changes from referring to God in the third person (He) to referring to Him in the second person (You).
- "Your rod and Your staff, they comfort me" the rod is a weapon, the staff is an instrument of service. The sheep have no reason to fear.
- II. The Gracious Host (5-6).
 - A. "You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies."
 - The scene he relates is that of a well-set table for guests.
 - Evil surrounds the table, but is powerless to disturb the occasion.
 - B. "You anoint my head with oil" the perfumed oil of hospitality.
 - C. "My cup runs over" the cup He pours is always filled to the brim.
 - D. "Surely [Only] goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life."
 - E. "And I will dwell in the house of the LORD forever."
 - 1. Continual fellowship with God, the owner of the house.
 - He will forever be satisfied with God.
