A Harmonious Congregation (Phil. 1:1-2)

From its beginning around 51 A.D., the Philippian congregation of God's people had a close relationship with the apostle Paul. The epistle he penned reflects this relationship, but it also demonstrates the bond shared within the congregation, considering how minor the congregational problems mentioned proved to be. Indeed, even in the simplicity of the opening greeting, Paul established the relationships that bound them together in spiritual harmony.

Writing from prison in Rome, Paul opened by introducing himself and Timothy, his fellow worker, as "bondservants of Jesus Christ." A gospel preacher therefore feels bound to serve – not for his own purposes and glory, but to glorify his Lord. Thus, a preacher feels obligated to preach the gospel (1 Cor. 9:16), to serve the souls of others, to save the souls of others (Mk. 10:45), and to sacrifice as necessary (Phil. 2:17). A preacher feels obligated to Jesus Christ, because he owes Him everything (Phil. 3:8). When a preacher accepts the work and life of a bond servant, what he does in that work and life should harmonize with the will of his Master, totally and completely, and this, in turn, will help him build harmony in the lives of others.

Interestingly, while people today regularly refer to one another as Christians, the apostle Paul chose to address his audience as "all the saints in Christ Jesus who are in Philippi." This places emphasis on the moral compass that should distinguish God's people both spiritually and morally in seeking to be more like God in heart each and every day, for this is the ambition of holiness (1 Pet. 1:16). And yet pure holiness remains impossible apart from a relationship with Christ Jesus whose promised coming as the Messiah served to provide for our salvation from sin (Acts 2:38; 1 Cor. 6:11; Gal. 3:26-29). However, Christians still live in the world, in the midst of a foreign society often hostile to morality and to truth. Nevertheless, distinguishing themselves as separate and distinct in a world gone mad should be the goal of saints each and every day (1 Pet. 2:11-12). Seeking holiness in every aspect of life keeps God's children in harmony with God's will and with God Himself, lifting Christians up toward heavenly things while on earth in preparation for ascending to heaven in the end.

Having addressed the essential character expected of all Christians, Paul then emphasized roles in the congregation divinely designed to help Christians in their holiness, beginning with bishops. The work implied by the word "episkopos" involves oversight, but its application extends far beyond popular notions. God gave bishops the responsibility not only of overseeing the assembly, but of overseeing the flock (Acts 20:28). Therefore, bishops must remain ever aware of the spiritual problems and needs of the individual Christians in the congregation (1 Thess. 5:14-15). Bishops must then constantly look out for toxic relationships, dangerous precedents, and insidious error (Titus 1:9-11). Bishops must keep a keen eye on

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any signs of impending apostasy on an individual basis to be able to come to that person's spiritual aid before they drift too far away (Gal. 6:1).

Paul's inclusion of deacons in conjunction with the bishops in this greeting shows the significance he placed upon the role, using a word signifying serving others, being active in the work, and completing orders. Deacons serve in whatever roles benefit the congregation and its work (1 Tim. 3:13), having first established the character to accept their responsibilities with grace and humility so as to ease the work of the bishops and aiding the congregation in seeking holiness (Acts 6:1-4). Thus, when deacons take their role in a congregation seriously, the work of the church can blossom as people grow from wanting to be served to learning to love serving, because they see it all around them.

The simple and oft-repeated greeting Paul includes in this epistle (as well as others) communicates far more than a general greeting. It unites the roles and responsibilities of Christians with the blessings and leadership of the Godhead in making what we do meaningful. By combining "grace" and "peace," the respective greetings of Gentiles and Jews, into one, the apostle Paul expressed the harmony possible when we leave behind human differences to accept divine distinctions (Gal. 3:28). More than that, these blessings, previously taken as physical in character, now have a spiritual quality directly related to being children of God and behaving as such (Eph. 2:8; Phil. 4:7; Rom. 8:15). Harmony in a congregation relates directly to how every member submits to the authority of the Lord, loves Jesus for the salvation made possible by His sacrifice, and commits to Christ living within (Col. 3:17; John. 15:13; 14:15; Gal. 2:20). Without what God has done through Jesus, there is no grace to save us and there is no peace for us, "[b]ut thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Cor. 15:57).

The spiritual harmony described throughout the rest of the book of Philippians testifies to the implications of Paul's greeting. More than any other epistle, the book of Philippians presents a congregation of Christians seeking righteousness together, overcoming problems together, reaching the lost together, and moving toward maturity together. However, these behaviors will not happen unless the preacher, the elders, the deacons, and the members share a mutual commitment to be what God expects so as to enjoy the blessings God wants to bestow. A congregation achieves spiritual harmony through spiritual people actively fulfilling spiritual responsibilities from a spiritual heart with a spiritual purpose. The apostle Paul emphasized all of these things to the Philippians throughout his epistle, but from the very opening of the book he demonstrated that none of this occurs magically. It come to life when God's people seek harmony by serving in harmony – in harmony with one another, in harmony with God's Word, and in harmony with God Him-

Grace's One Great Demand

Grace presents us with one great demand.

I know it seems strange to see the words "demand" and "grace" in the same sentence. Usually we view grace as the means by which we gain acceptance by God without carrying out works of the law. After all, as Paul reminds us, by "works of the law no one will be justified" (Galatians 2:16).

Many try to earn their salvation. They search the pages of Scripture to find all the demands made upon us and try to carry those out. They view themselves as the stringent Christians, the ones who hold to the highest standards. But grace possesses a demand that might even be greater than that of any legalist.

Those who advocate works of the law mistakenly believe they can do enough good works to merit their salvation. Of course, this is delusional on the level of the man who thinks he is the Easter bunny. Exactly how many good works would pay for one hour of Jesus on the cross? Or one minute, for that matter.

But grace presents us with a high demand, too. One that has often brought about surrender.

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What is this high demand that grace makes? The answer is very simple: We find that grace demands too much. It demands that we swallow our pride.

The cross offends us because it suggests that we were sinners, so deeply mired in our sin that his death alone could save us. Our sin was no misdemeanor; it was so serious it required the death penalty. It bears mute, but dramatic, testimony to the depths of our depravity. That hits us directly in our pride. That demands that we surrender unreservedly to Him, admitting not only our failure but our helplessness. Hence it is a blow to our pride.

"For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your doing; it is a gift of God" (Ephesians 2:8).

Studies for the week of June 18, 2017

Our Duty to God and Country - Matthew 22:15-22

Teaching in the temple, Jesus was approached by the Pharisees and Herodians.

- . They came with the intention of entangling Him in His teaching (15-16).
- They questioned Him whether one should pay taxes to Caesar (17).

Ever the Master Teacher, Jesus easily dealt with their question.

- . Seeing through their hypocrisy, He called for a coin (18-19).
- He asked whose inscription was on it they answered, "Caesar's" (20-21).
- Jesus replied, "Render therefore to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's" (21). They marveled and went away (22).

I. Our Duty to Country.

A. Pay Taxes.

- 1. This was the point of Jesus in our text.
- Paul also taught us to pay taxes (Rom. 13:6-7).

B. Obey Laws.

- 1. We are to submit to the laws of the land (Rom. 13:1-5; Titus 3:1).
- For the Lord's sake, that we might silence foolish men (1 Peter 2:13-16).

C. Fear and Honor.

- 1. We are to respect and honor those in positions of authority (Rom. 13:7).
 - a. We are to fear the king (Prov. 24:21a).
 - b. We are not to speak evil of our rulers (Ex. 2228; Ads 235; Tit. 3:1-2; 2 Pet. 29-11; Jude 8-9).
- 2. Even as we are to honor all and love the brethren (1 Peter 2:17).

D. Do Good

- 1. We are to be ready for every good work (Titus 3:1).
- 2. We are to have conduct that is honorable before all (1 Peter 2:11-12, 15-16).
- E. Pray (1 Tim. 2:1-3).

II. Our Duty to God.

- A. Love God with All Our Being (Matt. 22:34-37).
- B. Obey God from the Heart (1 John 5:3; John 14: 15, 21, 25).
- C. Make God Our Number One Priority (Matt. 6:33).
 - 1. Even over our duty to country (Acts 5:27-29).

While those in authority might not always understand their proper place, and might expect more of their citizens than what is right, may we who are disciples of Christ never fail to: "Render therefore to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's."

Miscellaneous Exhortations to Timothy - 1 Timothy 4:10-16

I. The Christian Life Involves Hard Work (10).

- A. Paul said that he both labored and suffered reproach because he trusted in the living God.
 - 1. Like Paul, our faith should motivate us to "labor" for the Lord!
- We should also be willing to "suffer reproach" for Him, just as Paul did!
- B. Paul referred to God as the Savior of "all men".

II. The Christian Life Involves Authoritative Teaching of Truth (11).

- A. Paul told Timothy to "command and teach" the things which Paul had said.
- B. The preacher has no authority of his own to command people to do anything; however, he does have the obligation and authority to speak the word of God (2 Tim. 4:1-2).

III. The Christian Life Involves Being a Good Role Model of Truth (12).

- A. If Timothy set the proper example, his brethren would not despise his youth.
- B. Paul told Timothy to provide an example to the brethren in the following areas: word, conduct, love, spirit, faith, and purity.

IV. The Christian Life Involves Reading, Exhortation, and Teaching (13).

- A. While Timothy was waiting for Paul, Paul told him to give attention to three things: "reading", "exhortation" and "doctrine".
- B. "Reading" his private reading or the public reading of the Scriptures.
- C. "Exhortation" encouraging to do what is right both public and private.
- D. "Doctrine" teaching or instruction.

V. The Christian Life Involves Fulfilling Assigned Tasks (14).

- A. Paul warned Timothy not to neglect the gift which was in him.
- B. This gift could have been a natural talent or ability, or a supernatural gift of the Holy Spirit.

VI. The Christian Life Involves Total Commitment for the Sake of Others (15).

- A. Paul exhorted "meditate on these things ... give yourself entirely to them".
- B. So that his progress and growth would be evident to all people.

VII. The Christian Life Involves a Right Self and Right Doctrine (16).

- A. Paul exhorted Timothy to "take heed to" two very important things.
 - 1. First, he was to pay very close attention to himself.
 - 2. Second, he must pay very close attention to "the doctrine".
- B. He must "continue" doing both of these things.
