Every Person Goes to Church Every Sunday

Church attendance can be a touchy subject. In a world that seems busier than ever, making it on Sunday mornings can be tough. But for those who make it a priority, worship isn't something to be missed. Others, however, don't seem to grasp the importance of prioritizing Sunday morning. Obviously I'm not talking about the sick, the infirm, or those who are kept away on occasion by unusual circumstances. It's those who make a habit of missing, and who do so by choice. But the fact is, on those Sundays that they missed, they didn't skip church. They just worshiped at another church.

For some, the bed is their other church. Saturday night ran over with movies or friends or whatever else was going on, and so Sunday morning will be spent worshiping another hour of sleep. Monday's work and school won't be preempted for sleep, so God is the one who gets placed on the back burner.

For some, work is their other church. There are certainly those who are caught in a work arrangement that doesn't allow them the time for gathering with their church family each Sunday, but there are also those who have the choice and decide to take the extra shift. For those folks who have a choice and neglect worshiping God, Sundays are spent worshiping a few extra bucks instead.

For some, sports are their other church. Whether it's the big game on TV or the youth sports a family is involved in, when sports win out over assembling with the saints, they've become a church of their own.

For others, leisure activities are their other church. The weather is great and it's a perfect opportunity to go fishing/camping/riding/etc. God is important most Sundays, but every now and then He just needs to take a back seat to the opportunity to go have some fun somewhere else.

The Old Testament makes it abundantly clear that God has no interest in a relationship where He isn't prioritized. Malachi 1 shows how God feels when His people are content to offer Him leftovers: "Oh that there were one among you who would shut the doors, that you might not kindle fire on my altar in vain! I have no pleasure in you, says the Lord of hosts, and I will not accept an offering from your hand" (v.10, ESV).

If God only gets the Sundays that aren't occupied by something "more important" or something that you'd rather be doing, you're serving Him leftovers. He loves you, and He wants a relationship with you so much that He was willing to die for you... but He's not interested in leftovers.

What is Sin?

What is sin? Sin may be doing wrong; equally, it may be not doing right. While being tempted is not sin, both doing wrong and contemplating wrong could be sinful. While this first answer might sound a bit vague, the Bible is very specific about what sin is. That detail is provided by the Bible's simple descriptions of sin.

First, "all unrighteousness is sin" (1 John 5:17). The statement sounds simple, and really, it actually is as simple as it sounds. That which is not righteous is necessarily unrighteous and all that is unrighteous is, therefore, sin. The word unrighteousness, the Greek adikia (ἀδικία), is defined by Strong as "(legal) injustice (properly the quality, by implication the act); moral wrongfulness (of character, life or act): iniquity, unjust, unrighteousness, wrong." Thayer more succinctly defined it "unrighteousness of heart and life." 1 John 5:17 reveals that doing wrong is sin.

Second, "sin is the transgression of the law" (1 **John 3:4).** This is another statement which sounds simple, and really is as simple as it sounds. This differs from the first, though, by showing that there is a standard at play. There is a Divine Authority, God, and that Divine Authority has revealed to man the Standard under which man must live and by which he will be held accountable, the Bible. Sin is going beyond the law of the Standard. Worthy of note is this point, however: Not all of the Bible serves as man's Standard today. The Bible student will remember that there have been three time periods in man's history: first, that from the Creation to the giving of the Law of Moses: second, that from Sinai until the Law of Christ was put into effect (Jos. 8:31; cf Acts 13:38,39); and, third, the current one under the Law of Christ (Gal. 6:2). Man is only amenable to the Law of Christ; however, the Old Testament retains great value (Rom. 15:4; cf 3:1,2) – albeit without authority over Christians (Col. 2:14). 1 John 3:17 reveals that violating God's law is sin.

Third, to know to do good, but not to do it is sin (Jas. 4:17). This also is as simple as it sounds. Doing

wrong is wrong, and doing that which is forbidden is wrong; James added another important element: Not doing right is also wrong. Man has not only received "Thou shalt not's" but also "Thou shalt's"; to not do the "Thou shalt's" is equally sinful as committing the "Thou shalt not's"! The sinful world has "clearly seen" "the invisible things of [God] from creation," but does not know Him, has not glorified Him, and has not been thankful [none of which are violations of "Thou shalt not's"]; rather, their lack of positive obedience has manifested itself in their disobedience – but even at the outset, they are "without excuse" (Rom. 1:20-23). Matthew 25:41-46 well establishes the great necessity of doing good by imposing the penalty of eternal punishment for doing it not. James 4:17 reveals that not doing right is sin.

Fourth, "whatsoever is not of faith is sin" (Rom. 14:23). In a context on conscience and scruples, there are instructions on how to handle the subject of eating meat which has been offered to idols [ultimately, in a companion passage, Paul concluded such eating was fine, since the idols were nothing and the false gods were nothing (1 Cor. 8:4)]. Two things are especially important for the one considering eating of such: first, one must try not to "put a stumbling block or an occasion to fall in his brother's way" (Rom. 14:13) – that is, not be the reason that the brother would sin or be weakened (Rom. 14:21); second, one must make sure that he has not violated his own faith (Rom. 14:22) – that is, if the one thinks there may be something wrong with eating such and would be violating his own conscience by doing such, he needed to avoid it (Rom. 14:23). When one is not sure whether a certain course is safe or not, he should avoid it altogether if for no other reason than conscience-sake! Romans 14:23 reveals that violating one's conscience is sin.

Sin is doing wrong; sin is violating God's law; sin is not doing right; and sin is violating one's own conscience. May these simple principles always be in the minds of the righteous.

What did Satan promise Eve?

Responsing to Our Culture: Not as a Zealot

Text: Romans 6-15 - 7:6

Fire comes to mind as we enter into a discussion of zeal or being a zealot. Fire can be a useful tool or an utter terror.

I. The Message.

- A. Most people do not mind being described as a person with zeal (a normal enthusiasm for an object or a cause) – however, most would not want to be called a zealot (one whose zeal is abnormal or to the extreme).
 - a. Zeal is necessary (Jn. 2:13-17; Gal. 4:18) however, a fanatical zealot attitude is detrimental to our goal of evangelizing the world.
 - Zealousness is detrimental when it is zealousness for the wrong thing (Rom. 10:1-3; Gal. 1:14; Rom. 6:15-7:6).
 - Zealousness is detrimental when it is for the right thing, but by the wrong method.
 - Zealousness is like fire as a useful tool zealotry is like fire as an utter terror.

B. Elements of zeal as a useful tool.

- 1. Fire is useful when it is controlled (Jas. 3:5-6, 13-14).
- 2. Fire is useful when it is concentrated.

C. Emphasis of zeal as a useful tool.

- Our zeal can be focus in the wrong place and not address the real, underlying issue: the heart.
- Our country can pass laws to regulate behavior, but without a change of heart, such is doomed to failure.

D. Effect of zeal as a useful tool.

- When men's hearts are changed, their attitudes and behaviors will be changed.
- 2. Men will then "walk in the newness of life" (Rom. 6:4).

II. The Application.

A. Let us peruse our perception.

- 1. There is a difference in how we see ourselves and how others see us.
- 2. A thermostat for zeal can be found in 2 Timothy 2:24-26.

B. Let us be zealous and not zealots.

1. When dealing with others, always "aim for the heart" in humility and love.

Walking By the Spirit (2) - Galatians 5:22-26

III. The Christian Walk (Chapters 5-6).

C. Walking by the Spirit (5:16-26).

- 3. "The Fruit of the Spirit" (22-23).
 - a. But serves as an adversative and contrasts what has come before with what comes after.
 - Paul shifted from warning of "works of the flesh" (19-21) to promote the fruit of the spirit – instead of vices, he began to discuss virtues.
 - 2) A tree bears fruit according to its kind.
 - b. Love
 - c. Joy a noun expressing the idea of gladness, delight, or happiness.
 - d. Peace.
 - e. Longsuffering.
 - f. Kindness can also be "uprightness", "goodness", and/or "generosity".
 - g. Goodness.
 - h. Faithfulness.
 - i. Gentleness other translations include "humility" and "meekness".
 - j. Self-control.
 - k. Against such there is no law referring to the entire list of virtues.

4. The Spirit's Victory over the Flesh (24-25).

- a. And those who are Christ's have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires – this is not accomplished through human power.
- b. "Flesh" here basically means the nature of man in his fallen state.
- c. When Paul spoke of "the flesh", he was referring to the entire list of "the works of the flesh" enumerated in 5:19-21.
- d. The Christians in Galatia had died to sin when they were united with Christ by putting Him on in baptism - therefore, Paul instructed them, If we live in the Spirit, let us also walk in the Spirit.

5. Paul's Admonition to the Brethren (26).

- a. Let us not become conceited, provoking one another, envying one
- b. "Let us not become conceited" = "Let us quit being conceited".
- "Provoking" literally means "call out to someone to come forward" suggests "combat or rivalry".
